The Trinity Spur Line Again.

Our readers will remember that quite a furore raged in Trinity West when the people there found that the branch line was being run on towards Bonavista without being taken into the heart of Trinity West. Many remonstrances were made, and eventually the people were given to understand by the Premier and the Colonial Secretary, that the spur line would be built and a station erected in Trinity town in readiness for the official opening of the line, which we are given to understand, is set down for the middle of next month.

Last spring, we are informed, Mr. Watson, Mr. Blandford and others wrote people there saying the debate in the House of Assembly had finally settled the matter and that the Reid Mfg. Co. would have to build the spur, whether they wanted to do it or not.

When the time came for the building of the stations and the freight sheds, Trinity West was passed by, and the stations and freight sheds at Trinity East, Fort Rexton and other places further along the line were built.

Last week the people of Trinity West heard that the Company proposed building the Trinity station at Mr. Jenkins's farm, near Got's Cove. It was against such a proposition that the original agitation started.

Immediately the people wired a protest to the Premier and called upon him to carry out the promises of himself and of the Colonial Secretary to put the line "right into the heart of the settlement." They asked for a reply and for four days waited for the answer that didn't come.

Mr. Grant arrived home on Friday and immediately wired to the Colonial Secretary. We are told that the Colonial Secretary replied to Mr. Grant saying the report about the station was "absolutely without foundation" and that "the contractor had

again been notified to carry the line into Trinity and to do so at once." At the time Mr. Grant's message came, our informant tells us, the work of erecting the station at Jenkins's farm had been actually commenced, so that the Colonial Secretary's characterization of the report as "absolutely without foundation" came as a surprise to the people.

On Saturday afternoon a gentleman received a note from Mr. Watson to the effect that he had seen their message to the Premier and that he might be interested to know that the Government Engineer had been instructed to notify the R. N. Co. that "no further payments will be made on account of the Bonavista branch line until such time as the line has been brought into Trinity proper."

He again wired him telling him that the station was actually in course of erection, and asked him, "Who is bluffing?" Mr. Grant also wired, and on Monday got the following reply: "No instructions of any kind sent contractors regarding station site Trinity. Notified contractors to-day that work undertaken without authority is at their own risk. Government Engineer out of town. . . . When in return matter will again be taken up with contractors."

Now, what they want to know is: Why are the contractors working "without authority?" Is there any "authority" over the contractors? Do the contractors recognize or heed the "authority" of the Government? Why are the contractors erecting a station and freight shed "without authority" and "at their own risk?" Is there any "risk?"

If the contractors are erecting Trinity station "without authority" and "at their own risk," what other works are they engaged in "without authority" and "at their own risk?" If the contractor can ignore the Government and appropriate private property, erect stations, etc., "without authority," isn't it about time that someone saw they were subject to some authority?

It is not so much the Company's refusing to build the Spur—which it appears they are doing—as the fact that they are apparently controlling the Government that makes the matter serious. If they refuse to do one work they have been ordered to do and do other things "without authority," someone should call "Halt!"
