

The outstanding incident of the quarterly meeting of the Mercantils Marine Service Association, held last week at Liverpool, was the presence of Capt. Harrison, late master of the Canadian Royal liner Royal George, who has just had his certificate returned to him by the Board of Trade. The circumstantial story narrated by captain Harrison of the Canadian intury into the grounding of the Royal George, and of the treatment he received at the hands of the Wreck missioner before whom the infiry was held, is certainly not calcuted to inspire confidence in Canadian

ne annulling of the decision of the Canadian Wreck ourt by the Board of Trade does, in was responsible for the casualty to this vessel. Further, the fact that this is the second time Captain Harrion has had his certificate taken from im and returned at the instance of the Board of Trade, suggests the necessity for some radical reform in Canadian marine casualty inquiries.
