How many talents, what great abilities, what fine qualities of character are wasted and made infinitely less valuable because they are not combined with dependability!

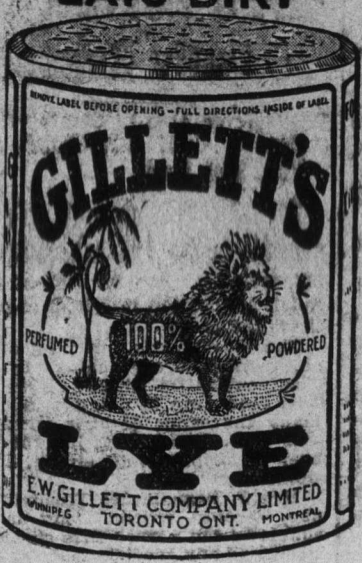
We all know workers of one sort or another who are capable of brilliant things, but who are passed by in favor of others less gifted because they cannot be depended upon.

**French Airman Daring.**

"A daring flight was made recently at the Juvisy aerodrome by Pegoud, the airman who recently descended by parachute from an aeroplane when flying at a height of about 650 feet. It was then stated that Pegoud intended to demonstrate the accuracy of the theories of M. Bleriot with regard to safety in the air. To-day Pegoud, flying in a Bleriot machine, rose to a height of nearly 3,500 feet and began a very rapid vertical descent. Heston intentionally turned the machine right over and made a volplane of nearly 1,500 feet upside down. Finally the aeroplane, obeying its stabilizer, resumed its normal position and made a good landing.

"M. Bleriot is devoting most of his energies at present to solving the problem of aerial safety. He points out that a very bad gust of wind can upset an aeroplane in spite of its automatic stability, just as even birds are at time blown over by a gale. What he is aiming at is the construction of air craft as impossible to upset as a lifeboat is unsinkable," says the times.

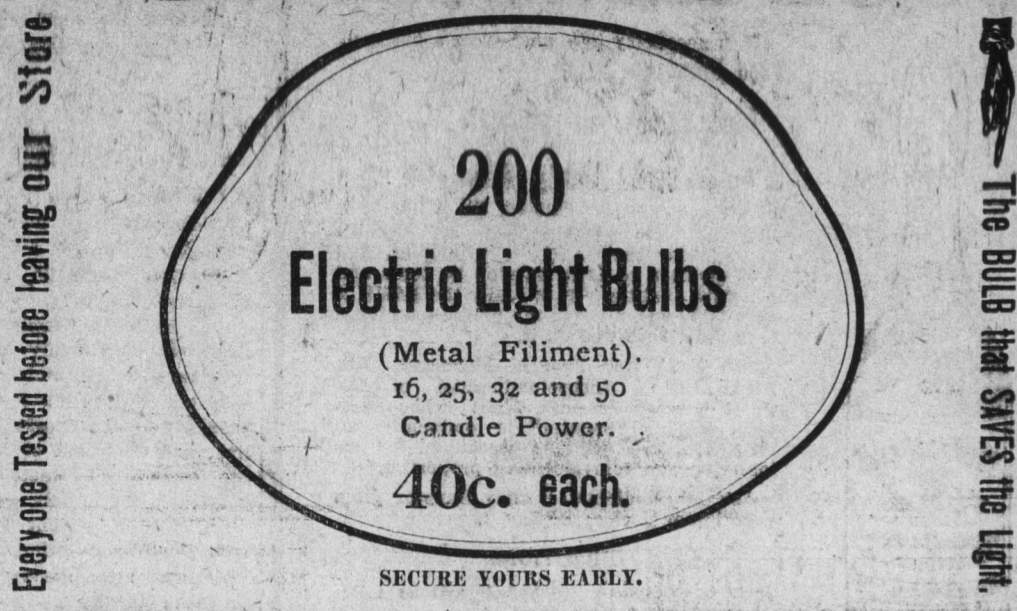

**Pastimes of a Hardy Race.**

Both in conditions and surroundings the Inverary Games, which have taken place in the heart of the land of the Campbells, are vastly different from the stereotyped athletic meeting to which the more sophisticated Saxons of the South are accustomed.

"Like the Grassmere Sports," says the Times, "in the famous valley between the steep sides of Silver How, they are a picturesque but none the less useful and symbolical survival of the past. Their chief characteristics are all local and indigenous to the soil. They are the primitive sports and pastimes of a hardy Northern race.

**Strength and Endurance.**

To this fighting stock of Highland men, as to their fathers of old, strength and endurance are of greater value than agility and speed. They can at need be nimble enough in the dances proper to the rapid tumultuous skirt of their native pipes. But at Inverary, as at every one of these modern gatherings of the clan, all through the late summer months up to the Northern Meeting at Inverness in September, the race is to the strong rather than the swift. These Highlanders run and jump, because running and jumping have always been a necessary part of the warrior's equipment. But they know nothing of carefully levelled cinder-tracks, and their costume is still in many cases the garb of Old Gaul.

"If Highland games are, therefore not prolific in the creation of records, and tossing the caber, putting the stone, and throwing the hammer are necessarily the more interesting events on the programme. Tossing the caber in particular excites the admiration of Southern visitors. A foot or two may have to be sawn off the tapering larch trunk before even the strongest can toss it on his shoulder so that it pitches on its thick end and turns properly over in a straight line with the

thinner end away from the thrower. But even so the feat must always be a splendid exhibition of physical energy. For ages past these Highland men have exercised themselves, with the simple everyday implements of the tree, the stone and the hammer, in struggling against the inanimate forces of nature, and their persistence in these homely sports is a thoroughly wholesome sign of the times. There is no thought here of the physical deterioration of the race. Everything is manly and vigorous. Even the four-square reels and Highland flings and sword-dances, and the judging of the pipe-music—though the prizes may fall too often to the professional experts who travel from one meeting to another as part of their regular business—are symbols of a vigorous and warlike past that, fortunately for Scotland and the Empire, is by no means dead. For in the best of these meetings there breathes still the old spirit of the clans.

**Sport of the Dalesmen.**

"In the same way the sports of the dalesmen at Grassmere, now some sixty years old, are a living and present refutation of the idea, too commonly entertained, that Englishmen are becoming less strenuous and vigorous than of old in bodily exercises. The leading events here are different from those in the Highlands, but they reflect in the same way the influence of local conditions.

"The Guides' Race over fell and moor, up the steep scarp of the hills to a point 1,100 ft. above the valley, their daring leaps from boulder to boulder, their scrambling dashes down precipitous slopes, is the outcome of their ordinary way of life as sheepherds and craftsmen. It is all part of the day's work."

**Queen Victoria In Movies.**

The life of the late Queen Victoria in moving pictures is now in preparation by one of the leading firms in the cinematograph business.
