### Terrible Tragedy on the Great Lakes.

PORT HURON, To-day.  
For the first time since Sunday a day has passed without revealing more lives lost in the storm which overwhelmed the Great Lakes early in the past week. Only one additional boat disaster developed yesterday, that was the wrecking of the steamer Major off Whitefish Point, Lake Superior. She was abandoned by the crew. The crew was picked up by a passing steamer at night. The life loss among sailors is estimated at 256, the property loss is figured at more than five million dollars.

### Want Parleys Renewed.

WASHINGTON, To-day.  
Instructions were sent to Chief O'Shaughnessy to-night indicating to him the extent to which the States Government will go in reopening negotiations with those in the counsel of Huerta who earlier in the day sought to renew parleys. The position of the American Government is that unless something definite is promised by Huerta officials, the resumption of negotiations would be fruitless. This was the state of the Mexican situation last night.

### Rebels Close Oil Fields.

VERA CRUZ, To-day.  
Rear Admiral Bouch reports from on board the battleship off Tuxpan, that he learns from the American Consul at Tuxpan that a large force of rebels are operating between that town and Tampico. They compelled the shutting down of all work in the oil fields of that region, in which 500 Americans are employed. The despatch adds that 65 Americans and other foreigners, including 25 women and children have been unable to leave Tuxpan and British American Consuls are urging the Mexican Government to send 1000 federal troops there to prevent the capture of the town by constitutionalists.

### Suffragette Attacks Redmond

NATIONALISTS READY TO CONSIDER ULSTER'S CLAIMS.

NEWCASTLE, Eng., To-day.  
John Redmond, Irish leader, and wife, was attacked by a suffragette while he boarded a train at Durham. The suffragettes entered the compartment where Mr. and Mrs. Redmond were seated. After declaring the Irish leader had not done enough for the women of Ireland, she struck him on the head and handed over to the police. The Redmonds' speech was delivered in the Town Hall last evening said there was no demand however extravagant or unreasonable that might be put forth on behalf of Ulster Unionists while Nationalists would not be ready to consider, so long as it was consistent with the principle of National self-government for Ireland. If the opponents of Home Rule remained obdurate and would agree to no reasonable settlement, Redmond besought the country not to slam the door in the face of Ireland because of the fear of fanatics or the bludgeon of the Unionists.

### Cable News.

WASHINGTON, To-day.  
Secretary of State Bryan exchanged messages yesterday with Chief O'Shaughnessy about the reports of concessions which Huerta's officials intimated would be made to the States. Efforts to recall John Lind from Vera Cruz, Mexico to discuss the American memorandums demanding a new Mexican Congress, should not convince, were taken here to indicate the group surrounding Huerta would suggest a compromise of the arrangement whereby the new Mexican Congress would meet, but would not pass upon the concessions and other measures calculated to continue Huerta's power. Officials are silent about the inner negotiations, but were optimistic.

LONDON, To-day.  
Discussing the Mexican situation, the Spectator says that even if President Wilson succeeded in inducing Huerta and the Government to retire, it is impossible to believe that the reformed Administration such as Americans earnestly desire can be established. One result of Mexico's humiliation, the paper adds, would be the establishment of some sort of National party with the purpose of shaking off American domination and war would only be postponed until Mexico was better prepared to fight.

LONDON, To-day.  
Viscount Haldane, speaking at Edinburgh and Augustine Birrell, Chief Secretary of Ireland, addressing an audience at Bristol, were subjected to suffragette disturbance last night. A dead cat was thrown at Birrell, and when offenders were ejected a general light ensued. In a speech Birrell said he hoped the settlement of the strike in Dublin would be speedily arranged. The Government were placing all legitimate pressure upon employers with that object in view.
