War News.

OFFICIAL.

LONDON, July 8.
The Governor, Newfoundland:
In Gallipoli the Turks made a general attack on the 5th. The attack failed completely. The enemy's losses were very heavy, and ours negligible. The French Government report further severe fighting on the heights of the Meuse, in the Forest of Apremont, on a front of about 760 yards. The Germans penetrated the French first lines, but elsewhere were repulsed with very heavy losses. Subsequently a portion of the lost trenches were recovered.
The Russian Government reports a successful offensive at many points. Near Krasnik 2,000 prisoners and several machine guns were captured.
BONAR LAW.

SAYVILLE PLANT TAKEN OVER.
WASHINGTON, July 8.
The United States Government today took over the Sayville, L.I. wireless station, the only direct means of communication between the States and Germany. Secretary of the Navy, Daniels, announced that Capt. Bullard, in charge of the naval radio had gone to take over the station, and would continue its operations with naval forces.

CARRANZA FORCES WINNING.
WASHINGTON, July 8.
Carranza forces have pushed their attack on the Convention forces, defending Mexico city up to within ten miles of the capital. Their military trains are operating this close to the city. State department dispatches from Vera Cruz to-day gave this report.

NO ANSWER TO GERARD'S INQUIRY.
WASHINGTON, July 8.
President Wilson has decided that there will be no answer to Ambassador Gerard's inquiry concerning the German Government's attitude as to its note on submarine warfare, and that no comment will be made by the States until Germany's formal reply is delivered.

GERMANY'S REPLY EXPECTED.
BERLIN, July 8.
The German reply to the American note regarding the Lusitania and submarine warfare, according to information obtained here, will probably be delivered on Saturday, July 10, or possibly even to-morrow. The general tenor and motive of the Government behind this proposal may be communicated confidentially to leading representatives of the press to-morrow.

ORNAMENTAL LIGHTS.

Ornamental lights form a good way of feeling the pulse of an American town. If a town has large quantities of cluster lights on its business streets, its pulse is strong and healthy and it has a Commercial Club which would soon grab a factory away from some other town, as at a piece of pie.

If, however, a town is filled with dark canyons at night, with over-worked electric lights trying to excavate holes in the blackness at the street corners, it is usually in a comatose condition, and the Secretary of the Commercial Club is working overtime to collect enough dues to pay his salary.

This is not because ornamental lights can bring a diseased town to life, but because they are the latest style in municipal hygiene. They give the city something to brag about. There are now something over 1,000 Great White Ways in this country, thanks to the committee boosters which have backed the reluctant merchants of hundreds of towns down into the cellar and have refused to let them come up until they have subscribed for two large iron posts apiece.

Pretty soon there will be so many ornamental lights in this country that they will not be worth bragging about. However, the town that has them will still be able to laugh at the morgue, divided into wards and precincts, which hasn't any. And one by one the sleepy cities and exurban eyes in a startled way and exclaim: "Goodness, let's get lighted up and shut off these corner jukes!"

Shortly after this the new style of lighting will be as universal as the Commercial Club itself. Then some genius will discover some new test of hustle like the down-town window-box, or the city manager, or the art censor for sign boards, and the contest will begin all over again.

The reason why American cities improve so greatly is because some city is always trying to get the jump on the bunch by adopting something to brag about, thus forcing other places to adopt the same thing, or better, in order to keep from blushing about it. Because of this relentless competition, some city in this fair land is going to adopt a leak-proof, politicianless Government some day and about three years later America will stop apologizing about its city halls.

Cardinal Mercier Thanks England.

Letter to Cardinal Bourne, Dated March 17, Reached London July 1.
London, July 2.—The Tablet publishes a letter from Cardinal Mercier to Cardinal Bourne. The letter, which is dated March 17, was received at the Cardinal Archbishop's house in Westminster yesterday.

Cardinal Mercier expressed his thanks for British charity toward the Belgians and concluded as follows: "Let me end by telling you that, though laboring under some constraint, our hearts cherish undaunted hope that, to apply England's proud motto, 'strengthened by God's help and confidence in the justice of our cause, the day will dawn when our united armies will restore peace and liberty to our land; and then, without restraint, we will be able to proclaim our heartfelt gratitude and show the world that even as Belgium preferred mutilation and endless suffering to the loss of honor so also she will ever remember her debt to England."

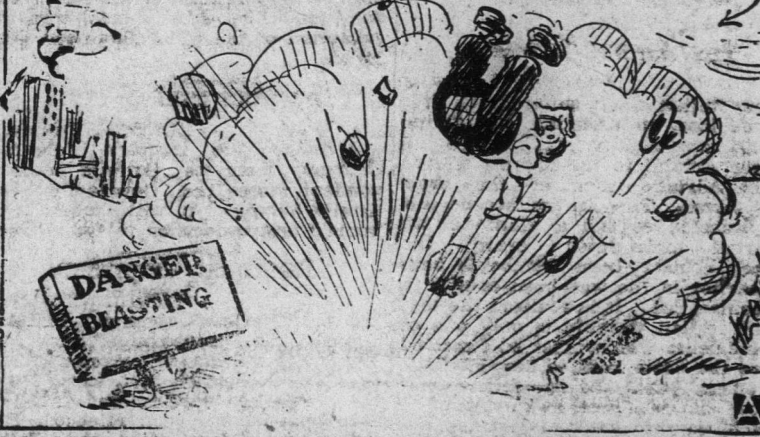

Won't Let Officers of the Navy Retire.

REMEMBER The Camera House

Washington, July 2.—Acting on the recommendation of Secretary Daniels President Wilson has declined to authorize the retirement from active service of about twenty Commanders and Lieutenant Commanders who had applied to be retired under the terms of the Naval Personnel Act of March 3, 1899. The main ground for this action was that the services of naval officers were urgently needed at this time. The President's action has a significant bearing on the question whether some officers of the army, who have tendered their resignations, have a right to leave the military service in time of peace. Some of these officers have had offers from manufacturers of firearms and supplies.
