Last Night's  
Recruiting.

All concerned are to be heartily congratulated upon the success achieved by the recruiting effort last night: we hope it is an earnest of greater success to come. To have got in one night nearly forty new volunteers from St. John's alone, which has already done so well, reflects great credit upon all who took part in the parade and seems to show that the particular method adopted, which we have always advocated, was a step in the right direction. The hint to the authorities is plain. More men are needed and needed urgently: let the best means of obtaining them be used. The same means, and on the same scale, as produced such good results last night might not be practicable in the outports, but the essential parts of it are. Martial music, military display, the testimony and exhortation of some of the brave men who have been and seen and fought—these are the stirring arguments that should be used, and used in combination.

Another slight observation which we presume to make is that the appeals commonly made to men eligible but hesitating, perhaps, for good and not unworthy reasons, dwell almost too exclusively upon the abstract principles of duty and honor involved. While this is the first and greatest consideration, and cannot be too strongly emphasized, it is not the only one; and we think the companion benefits and privileges that accompany the duty could with great advantage be urged more fully and more often. To indicate only one of them, we are among those who see in the splendid experiences of so many Newfoundlanders and in their return to their native land with broadened vision and priceless knowledge gained in the best of schools one of the most valuable factors in the progress of the country that could be imagined. The nature and value and actual benefits of this experience, apart from such more material advantages as the pay and keep, support of dependents, improved health and so on, are very imperfectly understood by the majority of the men at home. The same may be said of other actualities. Nothing should be omitted which could bring

home real facts to them, and mere words will not always do this. One expedient there is, the moving picture, which for some extraordinary reason has been overlooked entirely here. St. John's last year was enabled to see a splendid pictorial record of the life of the Regiment at Ayr. Why could not the outports see it also, and many others of the patriotic films that are widely distributed in other places and recognized to be among the most valuable of recruiting agents? The practical requirements are of the very simplest and the cost would be negligible.

These are only suggestions, but it is by such methods as these that the best results are obtained. If they are all used with energy, the results will be gratifying. If then there is still need of improvement there are other means left which it would be as well to recognize clearly. The Patriotic Association last night discussed seriously the question of registration. Registration is the mild-mannered brother of conscription. It is a regrettable fact that in some rare instances, fortunately very rare, sentiments have been expressed that savour almost of pro-Germanism. We can have none of this. At the beginning of the war it would have been strange enough: to-day, when the German nature and German methods have been revealed in all their infamy and brutality, it speaks an ignorance colossal and pitiable. It would be idle to attempt to remove it. The only thing worth while to remind the few individuals who hold such views and others who may be indifferent is the one fact that for the present at least we are under British and not German rule, and that our Government has power to compel any man, whatever his opinion, to take up arms in the British cause. This contingency will be imminent or remote exactly in accordance with the answer that is made between this and next March to the appeal for voluntary service.

## Give Him a Welcome

By to-morrow's express there returns to the city the Newfoundlanders who has rendered what all will concede to be the most valuable services to the cause that our Island can boast of. This is Major Macpherson, whose invention alone of the gas helmet has made him famous in the British Army. His other achievements and devotion to duty at the front are too well known here to need to be recapitulated. ## Big Army For Venice-Lps

Will Total 100,000 and Co-operate with the French, it is Said.

The Greek National Herald, published in New York, yesterday received a cablegram from its Salonika correspondent, which in a review of the situation in Greece says:

"The Provisional Government will proceed to completely organize the volunteers daily pouring in from every where. It is certain that an army of 100,000 men will be formed under Greek officers in collaboration with their French comrades, many of whom are already in the service of the Provisional Government. The allied powers have amply provided for this national army, which is to be armed and fed by them.

"The Venizelos Government will pay war indemnities to the officers and soldiers, and will provide their families in the same way as France is paying these indemnities. At the same time, the Provisional Government undertakes to secure the rights of the officers serving in the army of old Greece.

"For all these reasons, the Venizelos Government is indifferent to the falsehoods printed by the pro-German Athens press."
