TWENTY MILES OF GUNS.

BRITISH HEADQUARTERS IN RANCE, Oct. 8. (Via Reuter's Otta-ra Agency.)—The attack begun this orning by the British and American orces on the Cambrai-St. Quentin cont, has become open warfare in the sense of the term and the develping of various carefully worked out ianoeuvres into one great general cheme, which is to combine in securng pre-arranged objectives, and the ounding up of as many Germans as ossible.
