In Action Again.

The Royal Newfoundlanders are in action again, and evidently very much in the thick of the fighting, a deduction which is permitted by the length of the recent casualty lists received during the past few days. Exactly where our boys are, the authorities, for military reasons, do not announce, the only information sent them permitted being that they are a part of the famous 9th Division, which division is made up of some fighting Scottish regiments, who carry the names of many a hard won battle on their colours. That the Royal Newfoundland Regiment, with its short but glorious record, will be found now equal to any deed of valor that has been, or will be, performed by the gallant Scots with whom their battalion is associated, we can well be assured. Terra Nova's sons will not fail, any more than will auld Scotia's heroes, and Newfoundland could wish her boys no better companions in arms than those brave lads from the hills and heather.

A scrutiny of yesterday's list, shows that most of the casualties were from gunshot wounds, with a number of others brought about by gas poisoning. This latter even does not give any indication of the section in which the regiment is engaged, as the Germans are employing gas shells all over the line of battle. We might presume, however, to suggest that our men are with the divisions serving under General Byng, who is on the offensive in the Arras-Bapaume sector. If this surmise is correct they will get plenty of fighting, as Sir Julian is a driver, and we may expect further casualty lists of large proportions very shortly, for the Royal Newfoundlanders are not likely to be held back when there is anything big on. Their capacity for taking and giving punishment has been commented on by those who have seen them fight, and their tenacity in holding on to a position gained in the face of all odds has become a tradition. Newfoundland has nothing to fear from the practically new men now in the fighting line. They will gallantly uphold the record of those who have "gone West," and maintain the splendid reputation which the regiment won from Anzac's shores to Flanders fields.

Victories cannot be won without sacrifice and from the blood of those who die for the sacred cause of the Allies will come those big gains of perfect peace, which will enfold the whole world in its embrace and bring about the great day when war shall be no more.

To those who have died we render all homage. Whether stricken down by bullet or sickness, they have fought the good fight. They rest from their labour and their works do follow them. Doing their duty they gave their most priceless offering—their lives. No hesitation marked the performance of that duty. "Killed in action," is a noble epitaph, and generations will remember their heroism. No marble shaft may mark their last resting place, but in the hearts of their grateful countrymen they will have a more fitting monument than human hands can rear. They died gloriously—died as they should have died—as they themselves would choose—in the hour of victory. No mournful lamentations over their fate should be heard—they ask it not—but a triumphant Te Deum of thanksgiving, because of the beauty of their lives and the manner of their dying. They followed the path of glory, and that path led to the grave. They died that the ideals of Freedom should be established everywhere.

"The beauty of Israel is slain upon thy high places: how are the mighty fallen. Tell it not in Gath, publish it not in the streets of Askelon: lest the daughters of the Philistines rejoice, lest the daughters of the Gentile triumph. From the blood of the slain, from the fat of the mighty, the sword turned not back and the sword returned not empty. They were lovely and pleasant in their lives and in their death they were not divided. I am distressed for thee my brother Jonathan. Very pleasant hast thou been unto me."

Whatever sympathies we have to offer to the relatives of the gallant gentlemen who recently made the supreme sacrifice, are offered in these words of the poet king of Israel. They are at once a lamentation and a jubilation, a passion of rejoicing in that death has lost its sting and the grave its victory. For those who pass to-day's chronicle, "Heaven's light for ever shines, Earth's shadows fly."

Found Dead.

A woman named Jessie Emberly, of Bay de Verde, who for some time has resided at the home of Mr. J. Murphy, Buchanan Street, was found dead in bed yesterday. Deceased was about 47 years of age, had been suffering for some time from bronchitis and heart trouble, a sudden attack of which caused death. The body was sent out by to-day's train to the former home of deceased for interment.

Mr. Denis Collier, of St. Alban's (Ship Cove), Fortune Bay, died suddenly yesterday morning at his boarding house, 12 George Street. Deceased was ailing for some time, but not seriously ill, was stricken so suddenly that he passed away before medical assistance could be obtained. Dr. McDonald, whose surgery is quite near, hastened to the bedside of the stricken man, but death from heart failure had in the meantime occurred.

The Food Board

Price Maximum Retail Prices on Flour, Sugar and Molasses.

The new regulations recommended by the Food Board fixing maximum retail prices on flour, sugar and molasses, to come into effect after this date, is the outcome of information lodged with the Board during the past few weeks, showing that excessive prices were being charged for these commodities.

Within the City, sugar sold from 11 cents up to 16 cents per lb., second grade flour up to \$16.00 per bri., while in some Outports sugar went as high as 17 cents, second grade white flour to \$17.50, and molasses sold at the rate of \$1.40 per gallon. Within the past fortnight prices on war flour in certain quarters of the City had jumped from \$14.50 to \$15.50 per bri., the excuse offered being increases in the Canadian and local freight rates.

The Board on investigation found that freight rates had not increased to one half of the increase in price. It also found that there were some distributors, who were operating stores, selling at low margin of profit, on which a concern operating a grocery and provision business only could not survive, and there was a large number of such stores in the City and Outports.

The Board therefore concluded that to fix a maximum price at the level of the Outports with an amount equivalent to freight and insurance charges paid.

"All second grade white flour, \$15.00 in the City, and this price for Outports plus freight and insurance paid. War flour \$14.00 per barrel, and \$1.15 per stone within the City, and these prices in the Outports, plus freight and insurance."

"White granulated sugar 13 cents per lb. within the City, 14 cents in the Outports. All other sugars 10½ cents per pound within the City and 11½ cents in the Outports."

"Molasses \$1.20 per gallon within the City, and this price in the Outports plus freight and insurance."

The maximum price on white granulated sugar of 13 cents per lb. in the City and 14 cents in the Outports shows an increase of two cents per lb. over the lowest prices prevailing last week. This is due to an extra charge of about two cents per lb. at New York on the last shipment of sugar arriving here. The extra cent allowed for Outport retailers is to cover freight, insurance, and cartage charges.

It is understood that these regulations do not prevent any retailer from selling at lower prices.

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Evidence Against I.W.W.

FORMER MEMBER TELLS OF PLOTS TO DESTROY INDUSTRIES.

Chicago.—Stories of plots to destroy industries by sabotage were told on the witness stand recently by Joseph Durball, former member of the Industrial Workers of the World, who testified as a government witness against the 112 I.W.W., charged with violating the espionage act.

Under cross-examination by counsel for the defence Durball told of the I.W.W. war in the harvest fields, big lumber camps and manufacturing districts.
