CREW STILL MISSING.
As no word has yet been heard of the crew of the schr. "County of Richmond," reported lost near Ramona, it is presumed that the men must have been drowned whilst attempting to reach the land in their boat. A message received by Hon. P. Templeman from Mr. J. T. Moulton, the vessel's manager, stated that the schooner was lost on Little River Rocks, about 6 miles from Ramona, and that the crew of six were missing. The names of the missing men are:

Joe Benson, A.B., Portugal.

The cook, Norman Hare, is a son of the Captain's, whilst seaman James Hare is also a relative of the Captain. The mate, Wilson Spencer, and seaman Charles Spencer are brothers, and their sad and unexpected loss in sight of their own homes, will be doubly felt by their relatives and friends in Burgeo.

Seaman Joe Benson, is a native of Portugal and joined the vessel on her last trip to Oporto.

Severe Blizzard.

RAILWAY AGAIN BLOCKED.

The blizzard which prevailed during the greater part of yesterday, was one of the worst storms experienced here during the winter. On the higher levels the drifts attained in some places, a height of nearly twenty feet and people coming from work had to spend hours shovelling themselves in. Very few people were to be found on the streets last night and all places of entertainment were practically deserted. The railway line is again snowed up and last night not a single train was running.

S.S. Canadian Sapper from Halifax, and s.s. Manola from St. John, N.B., are due to-day, ice conditions permitting.

Schr. Asquith is now 40 days out from this port to Sydney for coal cargo. The Asquith is a comparatively new vessel, well found, and it is the opinion among nautical men that she will be heard from soon probably at one of the Western Islands ports.

TO-DAY'S MESSAGES.

COHALANISTIC.
CHICAGO, Feb. 21.
"The United States should insist upon Great Britain as treating Canada and the West Indies, as the basis of negotiations for a settlement of her war debt to this country," was the declaration of Judge Daniel Cohalan, of New York, to-night, in an address at the Washington Day dinner given by the committee of one hundred for an Irish Republic. "Great Britain, through war preparations in these places," Judge Cohalan declared, "was preparing for a conflict with the United States."

HOME RULE, APRIL 5.

LONDON, Feb. 21.
The Privy Council has decided that the Home Rule Act for Ireland should go into effect on April 6th. The first step under the Act is to be the issuance of writs for elections to the new Parliaments, which probably will take place three weeks afterwards. The Belfast Parliament will assemble in June. Present prospects seem to be that few candidates will come forward for the Southern Parliament, and it seems doubtful whether this Parliament will be formed.

PRITTING AWAY TIME.

PARIS, Feb. 21.
Though matters of great importance are to be considered by the Council of the League of Nations, the opening session of which was held to-day, the Council spent most of the first day in discussing the question of publicity, but without reaching a decision. Two decided currents were manifested: one favorable to the fullest publicity respecting the proceedings, as demanded at the last Geneva Assembly, the other stoutly resisting anything more than a bare communication to the public of results. A committee was appointed to consider amendments to the covenant of League, A. J. Balfour, Great Britain, being chosen as chairman.

BLANKETED AND COUNTERPANED.

NEW YORK, Feb. 21.
Greater New York succeeded only partially to-day in freeing itself from the thickest covering of snow that has fallen on the Metropolis this winter. To-night the Weather Bureau predicted the probable arrival, before dawn to-morrow of another blizzard that would lay a counterpane of sleet and snow over the heavy white blanket which already hides streets and sidewalks, and blocks traffic lines throughout the Metropolitan district. Street cleaning commissioner Lee asked the Board of Estimates for an appropriation of one million to pay for warfare against snow.

SYDNEY IN THE GRIP.

SYDNEY, N.S., Feb. 21.
Sydney and vicinity did not escape the storm, which spread over the whole Atlantic seaboard to-day, and in fact the blizzard proved to be the worst experienced in these parts during the last three years. Not a street car moved to-day. The incoming morning express reached the city to-night, ten hours and a half late.

THE SMYRNA DIFFICULTY.

LONDON, Feb. 21.
A plan for the administration of Smyrna district, formulated by Prime Minister Lloyd George of Great Britain and Premier Briand of France, at this morning's Conference, provides for the creation of a semi autonomous province in this territory, now occupied by Greeks. Turkey would retain civil and military control, but under Christian Governors approved by the Allies. This, it is considered, would guarantee the safety of Greek interests. The plan contemplates placing the judiciary and finances under an International Commission, with a Gen d'armie composed of both Greeks and Turks. The first Governor would be appointed for a term of five years, the appointee to be subject to approval by the Allies. This arrangement would be a settlement of the differences between Italian and British positions. Italians have favored the absolute withdrawal of Greek troops, and British have been in general for the maintenance of the Treaty of Sevres.

PATROL AMBUSHED.

DUBLIN, Feb. 21.
A military patrol of Crown Forces was ambushed last evening near Lillabuck by seventy men, armed with bombs and rifles, it was announced in an official headquarters statement to-day. One officer and three soldiers were wounded.

DELCO IN ICE.

NEW YORK, Feb. 21.
The United States steamship Delco, which recently left St. John's, Nfld., after putting in there last month with a broken propeller, is fast in the ice field one hundred and eighty miles east of Halifax, a radio message from the ship said to-day. The message stated that sea was calm.

BOLSHEVICS VS. GEORGIANS.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Feb. 21.
There still is no accurate news here concerning the fate of Tiflis. A Bolshevik wireless from Baku to Moscow, and also a British wireless from Tiflis dated last Saturday, gave details of heavy fighting at Pori Bridge on the Baku railway, East of Tiflis, where Georgians defeated Bolsheviks, taking four thousand prisoners, and also at the town of Ackstafa to the Eastward.

HAMILTON, Ont., Feb. 22.

Efforts of clothing manufacturers to cut wages from twenty dollars to twelve dollars, and from forty-five dollars to thirty-five dollars per week, resulted in a strike here last night of eleven hundred garment workers.
