WELSH COAL AVAILABLE.

"That there need be no shortage of coal in Montreal this winter, strike or no strike, was the statement of Mayor Martin this morning. He said that he had just received the following telegram from the acting Deputy Minister of Mines in Ottawa which speaks for itself.

Doctor Charles Camsell, Deputy Minister of the Federal Department of Mines at present in the old country, has cabled to-day to his office in Ottawa, as follows:-

"Please advertise fact that Welsh anthracite coal chestnut size, from five eighths to one inch. is now available at thirty-eight shillings a ton freight, Montreal. Address orders to Pascoe Colliery proprietor Swansea."

Mayor Martin said that this telegram will materially help to dispel the gloom occasioned by rumors of a threatened strike in Canada of the mines. He figured that the above quotation would werk out to about \$11.05 a ton at the present rate of exchange, which is over five and a half dollars a ton less than it can be bought in Montreal.

Ireland Originated the Baronetage.

King James I., wanting money for

maintaining an army in Ireland, asked the advice of the Earl of Salisbury, who suggested to him the creation of two hundred Baronets, each of whom should pay a thousand pounds for the privilege and honour. James expressed doubt as to the manner in which the new Order would be received by the great body of gentry. "Tush, sir," replied the Earl; "you want the noney—it will do you good, and the nonour will do the gentry very little harm. The first creation was on May 22, 1611, and it was a strict condition, that every candidate for the title should be worth a thousand pounds a year, and also that the title should die with him; but as aspirants for the honour were not too numerous, this latter clause was removed and the title made heritable. The first Baronet was Sir Nicholas Bacon, whose successors are styled "Primus Bronetorium Anglise." The reason why the sum was put at a thousand pounds was that it would maintain twenty soldiers in the Province of Ulster for three years at eighteen pence a day
