This was decided on rather than paying special attention to some particular class of exhibits. Application has been made for over 6,000 feet of floor space but only about 2,500 feet are available. One building is a wooden structure, one of steel, 50 x 50 feet and allowing for the rest of the whole space is about 3,640 sq. feet. Report of Conditions in Newfoundland

BY GENERAL MANAGER BANK OF MONTREAL.

The results of the present fishing season cannot yet be accurately estimated but it is believed that the total will be below average. Un satisfactory exchange conditions still militate against finding a profitable market. The demand from Portugal and Spain has somewhat improved but prices are low and the Newfoundland fisherman makes little or no profit over the cost of living. The seal fishery resulted in a total catch of 102,000 valued at \$200,000, as against last year's catch of 126,000 valued at \$197,000.

There is little activity in the mining industry at present, the output of ore from the mines at Bell Island being reduced.

The lumber business has shown a marked improvement, owing mainly to demand for construction purposes in connection with the important project of the Newfoundland Power & Paper Company. A large quantity of pit props has been exported to England and demand for pulpwood in the United States has been active.

The paper mills of the Anglo-Newfoundland Development Company Limited at Grand Falls have been running on full time and it is reported that their capacity may be increased. The Newfoundland Power & Paper Company are developing water power on the Humber River and plan to construct paper mills at Corner Brook on the West Coast with a capacity of 400 tons of newspaper per day. The financing of this important enterprise has been successfully arranged.

Manufacturing has been restricted during the year, owing to adverse conditions and difficulty in disposing of the output.

Wholesale and retail trade generally have been poor but in view of the increased construction work now in hand or contemplated, an improvement is expected.

Exports from Newfoundland for the fiscal year ending 30th June, 1922, totalled \$19,478,000 as against \$22,441,000 for the previous year. Imports were \$18,210,000 as against \$23,910,000. It will be observed that exports slightly exceeded imports whereas in the previous year the reverse was the case. There has been no increase in the Funded Debt of \$55,000,000 during the year. An issue of \$3,500,000 bonds has been authorized by the Legislature the proceeds of which are to be used for the general purposes of the Dominion.

During the year the long-standing disputes between the Government and the Newfoundland Company were settled, the Government purchasing the whole of the rolling stock, steamships and dry dock from the Company.

There has been a certain amount of emigration to Canada and the United States where wages have been more attractive.

Conditions in the Dominion cannot yet be described as normal, but the general situation shows improvement.

Texas Shoot it Out in Room

Toe to Toe, Left Hands Clapsed. Both Men Are Found Dead, Each Still Grasping Empty Revolver.

Tempe, Tex., Oct. 26.—Details of one of the trimmest pistol duels in the history of Texas have been revealed here by Sheriff David Terry of Navarro County.

The dead are Norwood Huckaby, member of a family prominent in Freestone County for more than a

half century, and Charles A. Williams, until recently a resident of Navarro County.

The battle occurred in a little room in the barn of T. F. Young, Jr., at Young, in Freestone County, shortly after dusk Wednesday night.

Toe to toe left hands locked together, their right hands clutching revolvers which they fired until neither could summon strength to pull the trigger again, Huckaby and Williams died within a few minutes of each other.

Four bullets took effect in Huckaby's body, three in the chest and one in the side. Williams was hit in the

forehead, right breast and side. Two pistols, one a 38 calibre and the other a 32 calibre, were found clutched in the men's hands. Every chamber had been discharged.

Huckaby was a widower with four children and lived at the Young home.

Previous trouble between the two men in which Huckaby received a bullet wound in the leg, was believed to be the motive for the shooting.
