The Rights and Privileges of a Privy Councillor.

There has been considerable missppre-hension as to the nature of the henor

office of a Privy Councillor of Great Britain is purely honorary; no salary at-taches to it, nor any other distinction than the title of "Right Honorable," and taches to it, nor any other distinction than the title of "Right Honorable," and certain claims to precedence. The Privy Conneil dates back to the era of the Saxon kings, and represents that body of councillors whose advice was supposed from the early times of the Constitution to relieve the Sovereign from personal responsibility. It was this institution in which originated the theory that "the king can do no wrong." Originally the Privy Councillors were twelve in number, but they were increased in later times, until, in the reign of Charles the Second, the number was limited to thirty. The Cabinet Council, however, consisting of the great officers of State, who are also Privy Councillors, has in modern times superseded the more ancient body, and the Privy Councillor, or certain members of it who are not members of the Cabinet, is only summoned on extraordinary oceasions. It is, however, quite consistent with the character of the office that it should be conferred on persons who, in a confidential capacity have rendered service to the sovereign. Lord Palmerston offered the dignity to Richard Cobden, after the negotiations which resulted in the Free Trade Treaty with France in 1860, but Cobden refused, chiefly, it was understood, from the extreme reluctance he felt to accept any honor at the hands of a Minister, to whose general policy he was so determinedly hostile. There is nothing exceptional, therefore, in Sir John A. Macdonald being made a Privy Councillor's an an acknowlegement of his services on the Washington Joint High Commission. In addition to those who are made Privy Councillors by Royal favor, certain personages are Privy Councillors by courtes. Thus the Lord Mayors of London, York and Dublin are styled "Right Honorable" although they are never called upon to set or sworn into office.

Ontarlo Temperance League.

The second annual meeting of the Contario Temperance and Prohibitory
Leaguewas held in the Temperance Hall,
Toronto, on Tuesday. The Rev. A.
Sutherland, President of the League, occupied the chair, and there was a fair attendance of members. After the trans-action of some preliminary business, Mr. Joseph Ryan, of Guelph, read a paper on the subject of Prohibition, in which he advocated the settling of the question at the polls, and the forming of an electorial league to that end. The paper was to consider the President's addr annual address, in which he recommended several amendments in the constitution, which would have the effect of giving greater efficiency to the League.

The Committee on resolutions, in their report, said they did not agree with Mr. Ryan as to the desirability of forming an electoral league at present, though they thought the battle of Prohibition must

soon be fought at the polls.

Some discussion followed on the report of the committee on Mr. Ryan's motion; the suggestions contained in the Presideents address being adopted. It was finally agreed to postpone the settlement of the proposal until the full meeting of

the League.
The Association met on Wednesday morning at 8 a.m. The Committee on Legislation presented their report. They recommend that the Council of the recomm end that the Council of the League prepare petitions to be presented to the Legislature of Ontario at its next annual session praying for the passage of an act entirely prohibiting the sale of intoxicating luquors in the Province of Ontario, and that every means be taken for the wide dissimination of such petitions in every municipality. Also that the co-operation of existing temperanee organizations be respectfully requested, so that these petitions may be presented to any one and every one who would be willing to sign them, throughout the Province. After some discussion it was agreed to submit the resolution for the consideration of the legislature, and, if approved of, to let the question afterwards go before the courtry.
