The Salt Deposits of Ontario.

A., in a paper to the \*Imerican Journal of Science and Arts, gives some interesting facts regarding the principal wells, eight of which he has recently examined. The Ainley-wille well was sunk 1,244 feet and then abandoned. The position of the boring marked the north eastern margin of the ancient salt lake, and the goological-horizon of the salt was passed without the least evidence of its occurrence. The Kincardine well reached the depth \*J 957 feet, and the Goderich company's boring struck the salt rock at exactly 1,000 feet helow the surface. From this depth was obtained, by pumping, a saturated brine to be manufactured to be manufactured to the conordage formation, and is at once recognized by the presence of salt ferous and typisterous magnesian marls, lving as a general rule above the sait bed.
