# James Taylor's COMIQUE OPERA Company, Town Hall, Friday, Oct. 24th.

About two o'clock on Friday morning last the occupants of the Green Bush Inn, about two miles north of Mount Forest, on the Owen Sound Road, discovered the building to be on fire. Assistance was rendered by some neighbors, but the fire had made such an advance that much of the stock and other contents were consumed, together with the building. The stables escaped.
