SWEDE WINS RACE
BREAKING RECORDS

Ljungstrom First in New York Marathon With Crowley Second And Another Swede Third

New York, April 2.—Ljungstrom, of Sweden, proved today that he is the best long distance runner on this side of the Atlantic by winning the second professional Marathon at the Polo Grounds. He won with a breezy rush by a third of a mile from James Crowley, the Irish Marathon racer in 2:34.06.2-5. This beats the record made by the Frenchman, St. Yves, over the same course a year ago by 6 minutes 45-1-5 seconds.

Thure Johnson, another Swede, was third, five hundred yards behind Crowley, with Ted Crooks, an American, fourth.

The other two survivors, Fred Meadows, of Canada, and Johnny Hayes, of this city, who won the amateur Marathon in London two years ago, were badly distanced.

Holmer cut out the pace from the start and before he had gone many miles he led by three hundred yards. This advantage he held up to the eighteenth mile breaking the local track record of St. Yves. Then Ljungstrom passed him after a wonderful sprint. He kept on but his running shoes proved his undoing and he had to quit after passing the 22 mile mark. His legs were bleeding and he was stopped and he had to be assisted off the field. During the last five miles of the race Ljungstrom simply loomed ahead of the others and made a brilliant start at the finish and seemed strong enough to go twice the distance.

Matt Maloney, who was training for the start, retired after going 11 miles and Umberto Blazie, of Italy, was carried to the dressing room after nearly fainting from exhaustion and his trainers bore him, protesting, off the field.

Percy Sellen, of Toronto, who was a prominent factor for two miles, dropped out after Holmer retired and this reduced the field to six.

Crowley ran a same plodding race and both he and Johnson finished under the time made by St. Yves last year. Crooks and Meadows got fourth and fifth share of the prize money.

Hayes finished sixth, many laps behind. His time was not taken, as there were only five cash prizes.

The track was six laps to the mile and was in fine condition. About 16,000 persons saw the contest. The weather was splendid.
