TWO YOUNG MEN KILLED.

THE GRAHAM ROAD BRIDGE THE SCENE
OF A FATAL ACCIDENT.—TWO MEN
DEAD AND FIVE INJURED.

At 9 a.m. Thursday, while the men were
at work on the iron bridge across the River
Thames, two miles north of here, connect-
ing the townships of Moss and Aldborough,
the bridge gave way, hurling the men into
the river fifty feet below, killing two and
injuring five. The killed are James Lamb,
of Acton, head split open; Alex. Water-
worth, son of Joseph Waterworth, Moss,
neck broken. The injured are John Mad-
dington, foreman, leg and hand badly
bruised and one finger taken off; Ben Camp-
bell, leg bruised and wrist badly sprained,
besides a severe shaking up; Hiram Lum-
ley, shoulder and side badly bruised and
leg hurt.

The stonework has been successfully
built by Messrs. Farquhar & Bro., of To-
ronto, and the iron work was about to be
placed on the stone piers by the Hamilton
Bridge Company. It appears that in dig-
ging the foundations for the piers a quan-
tity of blue clay had, when the water was
low, been thrown out in the bed of the river
last fall. In putting down the timber for
the trestlework to support the iron girders,
the ends of the sticks of timber appear to
have been driven into the blue clay referred
to, and after the recent rain, the water
washing away the earth from the false
posts on the south bank of the river, let
them slip inwards, allowing the bridge,
which was heavy with the weight of iron
on it, to go endways towards the south bank.
When the accident took place Lamb and
Waterworth were sitting down, engaged in
welding some of the iron works together,
and had no chance to save themselves, as
the bridge went down suddenly. The rest
of the men jumped, and were more fortun-
ate. The loss to the company will be con-
siderable, as the bridge would soon have
been completed.

wages, when on duty, \$2 per day.

A double funeral took place at the
Jubilee Baptist Church, Malahide, on
Sunday 6th, when the last respects
were paid to the remains of two aged
ladies, mother and daughter. Mrs.
Abigail Northrup, aged 94 and Mrs.
Tameer McConnell, aged 73.

CAST UP BY THE WAVES.

On Wednesday afternoon of last week
Mr. Mitchell, of Delaware west, was walk-
ing along by Weekes Cove in Caradoc his
attention was attracted by something stick-
ing out of the mud, left by the recent floods,
which on examination proved to be the
body of a man. Information was speedily
given to the coroner, Dr. McLaren, who
telegraphed to the Crown Attorney for in-
structions as to holding an inquest. The
body was brought over to Delaware and
placed under the town hall. On examina-
tion it appeared to be the body of a young
man from eighteen to twenty years of age,
no hair on his face, but closely cut black
hair on his head, apparently well dressed
with two pairs of pants on. He is about
five feet nine inches in height, very slight
build. Must have come down with the re-
cent floods and partly buried in sand.
Mr. Gilmour, of London, went to Dela-
ware to ascertain if the body was that of
his son who disappeared during the winter.
The remains were fully identified as those
of the missing young man.

Archbishop Lynch, of Toronto, died
on Saturday last and was buried on
Wednesday of this week.

St. Thomas has entered into a three-
year contract with the Electric Light
Company at 28 cents per light per
night. The city now has 14 lights on
Talbot street and 8 on other streets for
which they have been paying 22 and
25 cents per light.

vision do now adjourn.—Carried.

by J. Milligan, That the assessment
roll be adopted as revised and D. Mc-
Lean receive a cheque for \$75 salary in
full as assessor.—Carried.

Moved by H. Garbutt, seconded by
J. Milligan, That a committee consist-
ing of the reeve and the mover be ap-
pointed to examine the bridge at Tyr-
connell with power to repair or rebuild
the same.—Carried.

Moved by J. D. McDiarmid, seconded
by J. Milligan, That the application
of the trustees of S. S. No. 10, in the
Township of Dunwich, for the passing
of a by-law authorizing the issue of de-
bentures for the sum of \$1,800 for the
purpose of erecting a new school-house
with the necessary appendages in S. S.
No. 10 be accepted, and that the clerk
prepare a by-law for same.—Carried.

By law No. 363, to raise by way of
loan the sum of \$1,800, for the purpose
of erecting a new school-house in S. S.
No. 10, was read a first, second and
third times and finally passed.
