A letter from the Sheriff of Sunderland, of the 17th, says that none of the persons attending the sick have been seized with the disease.

The following is an extract of a letter received in London on the 19th from Newcastle on the 19th:—"I am just come from a meeting of the Board of Health there are several bad cases, but all are now satisfied that it is not contagious, as none of the attendants have taken it."

So far from having more deaths here than we have generally at this season, we have rather fewer. For two days we have had a slight covering of snow on the ground, with ice half an inch thick."

One of the London papers of the 19th, says "Some idea of the difficulty of obtaining confirmation may be guessed by the fact that the medical men employed in the town dare not avow that this malignant disorder is the same as the Indian cholera. It is consoling to know that not a single case has occurred out of the town, although the land communications continue open entirely as usual."

Great apprehension from the cholera, were entertained in Italy. According to the returns made at St. Petersburg up to Nov. 3, the total number of cases by the cholera in that capital was 9,228, of deaths 4,745.

On the two days of the 2d and 3rd there were only four new cases. The following accounts is taken from a letter dated Brunswick, Nov. 5:—"M. Weichard, one of the opulent merchants of this city, having been treated for the cholera by the administration of camphor, died of an apopleptic fit; all his family have been attacked, and two of his children have sunk with him to the grave. The disease is making great progress on this side, and it is remarkable that a great mortality prevails among the feathered race, and that the usual birds of passage have not made their appearance this year."

The number of new cases of cholera at Berlin, on the 13th November was five. The number at Vienna, on the 12th, was 28.

They wrote from Dresden on the 12th, that the cholera had made its appearance in Saxony. But according to the announcement of the Government, there was but one case, that of the curate of Andobaga; and the physicians, on a post-mortem examination, pronounced the disease not to have been the Asiatic, but the common or sporadic cholera.
