House of Commons—Girls on Strike.

The Scotch strikers are much encouraged by the result of the division in the British Commons on Mr. Channing's motion to censure the railway companies, for that is what it amounted to. The Government opposed the motion, but it came within seventeen votes of being carried, a closer margin than the Government has encountered since it risked defeat on the Public House Endowment Bill. While it is true that many strikers have gone back to work, the majority are still out, and the fight is not yet onded.

Three hundred girls in the Standard underwear factory at Jackson, Mich., went on a strike over the system of not checking the goods until the work is finished. Nearly every article passes through many hands, and is not complete for a month. This fixed it so the girls had no money to pay their board with or live on. The matter is under advisement, the girls refusing to work under the new system.

The Bricklayers' and Masons' International Convention at Toronto, resumed their sessions Monday and took up the reports of the Committee on the Constitution. Several changes were discussed, but only a few were adopted, and these related only to minor particulars. The present system of clearance cards leads, it seems, sometimes to abuse. Members are apt sometimes to delay too long in presenting their cards when they change residence and the funds of the organization suffer. An alteration was agreed to which will have the effect of removing the cause of complaint. The convention will probably bring its sessions to a close to-morrow (Wednesday).
