s Given to Toronto Industrial Ex hibition Association in Prizes.

Toronto, Aug. 7 .- Few people have any idea of the real magnitude of Toronto's great exhibition. It will therefore interest many to know that while the total prize list amounts to nearly \$40,000, upwards of \$20,000 is given to live stock, not including poultry, as follows: Horses, \$10,197, including \$3.-715 for trotting and running, of which \$2,000 is comprised in the Trotting Breeders' Association stakes; cattle, \$5,756, not including prizes given by special breed societies; sheep, \$2,465, and pigs, \$1,855. A score or more of silver medals are also given for the best of the different breeds in each department. For poultry, the prize list amounts to \$1,591. The exact to-

tal for live stock, entries for which on Saturday, Aug. 8, at offices of the Toronto Industrial Exhibition Association, 82 King street east, Toronto, is \$21,864. Entries also close on the 8th inst., for dairy products, fine arts, ladies'work, honey and all classes of manufacture, but supplementary entries will be received on almost any day next week. Single fares for the round trip have been arranged for the whole time of the exhibition from all points in Canada.
