ATTEMPT TO MURDER

Charge Against a Man Who Re-
sisted Arrest.Verdict of Acquittal in the Oil Springs
Case—A Boy's Sentence.ATTEMPT TO MURDER (Hear-
ing).

Smith's Falls, Ont., Oct. 12.—The charge of attempt to murder laid by Chief McGowan against Hudson Payne received preliminary attention before the mayor here yesterday. The trouble arose from an effort made by the chief to arrest Payne on a warrant charging him with theft. The chief went to Payne's house on Oct. 2, and invited himself to accompany him to the lockup. Payne at first agreed to go, and went to put on his coat. The chief waited outside, and when Payne again appeared he attacked the officer with some weapon, and wounded him severely on the left temple. The chief's call for help received no attention, and he, in a bleeding and dazed condition, began to run. Payne overtook him and struck him again, and then a crowd of men who appeared on the scene disarmed him, and he was taken to the police station. Payne will be tried at the Perth assizes on a charge of theft and attempt to murder.

THE OIL SPRINGS CASE.

Petrolia, Ont., Oct. 12.—The verdict rendered in the Oil Springs tragedy held at Oil Springs virtually means: "Died from some unknown cause." This is the case in which the brothers, James and Joseph Clarke, had a quarrel, and a fight, in the course of which Joseph was supposed to have received fatal injuries.

PUGILIST EXONERATED.

Philadelphia, Oct. 2.—The coroner's jury investigated the death of "Steve" Flanagan, ex-bantam weight champion pugilist, who died last Saturday from the effects of a boxing match with James Devine, the previous night. A verdict was rendered that Flanagan's death had been due to over-exertion. Devine was exonerated from blame and discharged.

INTENT TO KILL.

Montreal, Oct. 12.—Alfred Lalonde, an 18-year-old boy, who was convicted of shooting, with intent to kill, a boy named Chausse, was yesterday sent to the penitentiary for seven years.

MAY GO CRAZY.

Frankfort, Oct. 11.—H. E. Youtsey, one of the alleged murderers of Governor Goebel, is likely to become insane. He is comatose part of the time, but sometimes says: "There is no blood on my hands."

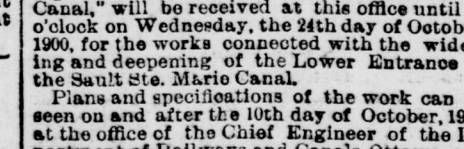

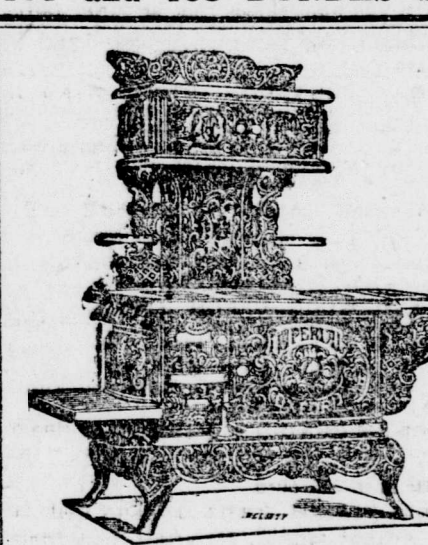
