U. S. Battleship Kentucky May Call on Them.

British Newspaper Comment on the Elections.

Proposal to Tax Childless Married Couples and Celebrities—Composition of the British House of Commons.

GALES IN GREAT BRITAIN.

London, Nov. 9.—A heavy gale swept over Great Britain yesterday. There were several vessels wrecked along the coast, and many persons were drowned.

MOORS MUST CASH UP.

The instructions of the United States department to Consul Gunners, at Tangier, under which he acted yesterday, were to collect an indemnity from the Moorish government for the murder of Marcus Essagin, a naturalized American citizen, who was killed about a year ago by a mob. The big battleship Kentucky is going through the Mediterranean to Manila, and she touches at a Moorish port her presence may have a stimulating influence on the authorities.

TAX ON CHILDLESS MARRIAGES.

Paris, Nov. 9.—In parliament the Socialists started a preliminary skirmish against the government, but the interpellations which were expected to involve stormy debates were not reached. In the senate M. Piot introduced a bill aiming to arrest the depopulation of France. It provides for a tax on celibates of both sexes after they reach the age of 30, and upon childless couples who have been married for five years, the tax to be maintained until a child is born to them.

TWO YEARS FOR DUELING STUDENT.

St. Petersburg, Nov. 9.—A student at the University of Dorpat has been sentenced to imprisonment for a term of two years for having killed a fellow-student in a duel a year ago. The government has virtually broken up the German dueling association at this university.

McKINLEY CONGRATULATED.

Among the telegrams of congratulation received by President McKinley are the following:

"Paris, Nov. 8, 1900. 'His Excellency Monsieur McKinley, President U. S. of America: I beg you to accept my most sincere congratulations on your re-election to the supreme office that you have filled with such luster during which the bonds of true friendship between our two countries have, to my great delight, been drawn still closer. 'EMIL LOUBET.'"

COMMENT ON BRYAN'S DEFEAT.

England's leading representatives of high finance have been interviewed by the London correspondent of the World relative to the election in the United States.

The governor of the Bank of England, Samuel Stewart Gladstone, said: "McKinley's election must have a healthy effect both financially and politically. I consider it, in the first place, as a great security for the peace of the world. Here, undoubtedly, the belief has been that if Bryan were elected it might mean disturbance and unsettlement in the financial world. Now we may look

to a revival of business and a strengthening of American securities."

At the London office of the Morgans, Pierpont Morgan said: "I consider that the settlement of the question is a relief to business interests both here and in America. The general effect on commerce and finance must be excellent. For the past fortnight prices have shown an upward tendency, and the general relief has been expressed by the further immediate improvement."

"As to the silver movement, now it has got the finishing stroke. The buying of American securities here is mainly for America. There has been a steady stream of buying for some time past, but now that McKinley is elected English money will also be forthcoming for American stocks."

CABLE NOTES.

The Japanese battleship Mikasa, of 15,200 tons, said to be the most formidable vessel of its kind in the world, was launched on Thursday at the Vickers-Maxim works at Barrow. Negotiations for the sale of the Danish West Indian Islands, which have been lagging because of the campaign in the United States, will now be resumed.

Count Johann Palffy has offered the Austrian Government his estates in the Palatinate of Presburg, valued at 2,400,000 kronen, or about \$500,000, on condition that the income be applied to providing scholarships of from 700 to 1,000 kronen a year for Hungarian students at the universities.

The opinion prevails in Paris that the re-election of President McKinley will lead to a Franco-American commerce convention.

Vice-Admiral Sir Edward Hobart Seymour, K. C. B., in command of the China station since 1897 (who is to be succeeded by Vice-Admiral Sir Henry Holdsworth Rawson), has been appointed a G. O. B., and Captains Bayly, T. Burke, Col. Agha and Jellicoe have been appointed C. B.s for services in China.

The Russian Government intends sending an agent to the United States to study homestead legislation with the view of its partial application to the peasant communities.

The whaler Eclipse arrived at Dundee yesterday from Davis Strait with a party of Arctic scientific explorers, including Messrs. Stein and Warming, Americans, and Dr. Kann, an Austrian, who secured important information as to Ellesmere Island.

Learned men of St. Petersburg are planning a scientific expedition to examine the immense number of manu-

scripts at Mukden discovered by the Russian troops, among them being ancient Greek and Roman documents, supposedly taken by the Mongolians on their retreat from the Occident. They are believed to be of great historical value.

ALBERT EDWARD

The Prince of Wales is 60 Years Old Today.

London, Nov. 9.—Albert Edward, Prince of Wales, was born Nov. 9, 1841. In the coming year, 1901, six centuries will have passed since an English king, for the first time, conferred the rank and title of Prince of Wales upon his eldest son. During this long period no Prince of Wales reached an age as advanced as that of Queen Victoria's heir is at present. No one held that position as long as Prince Albert Edward. In this respect he has surpassed his grand-uncle, who was Prince of Wales more than 57 years, and succeeded to the crown as King George IV. in his 58th year. In point of time the tenure of the present prince's position is as unprecedented as the length of Queen Victoria's reign is in British history. With the exception of William IV. there has been no English king who was not younger at the time of his accession to the crown than the Prince of Wales is now.

The title of Prince of Wales is not a continuous title. It is never conferred upon one who is simply heir-presumptive, and it was, therefore, in abeyance during the reigns of George IV., William IV., and the four years of Queen Victoria's reign preceding the birth of the present heir-apparent. It is less generally known that even when a Prince of Wales has a son, like the present prince, the title is not hereditary, in point of law, but upon the accession of a Prince of Wales to the throne or upon the death of a Prince of Wales during the sovereign's lifetime merges in the crown, and a new creation becomes necessary. The present Prince of Wales should succeed to the crown, his son would not immediately be Prince of Wales, though he might be called so by courtesy. But the new king would certainly create his son and heir Prince of Wales. If the Queen should survive her eldest son the title of Prince of Wales would also be extinguished, and the present Duke of York, though he would obtain his father's title only under a new creation.

AN ALIEN MUST GO

Ordered To Be Deported on or Before Saturday.

Hamilton, Nov. 9.—Edward Williams, owner for the enforcement of the alien labor law, has made a thorough investigation of the alleged importation of aliens to work at the Hamilton Steel and Iron Company's blast furnace (the smelting works). He found that eight men had been brought from the United States. One of these was the new superintendent, Mr. O'Keefe, one an expert, and one a workman. These three, and these only, were United States citizens, and the one alien workman was ordered to be deported on or before the 10th. The superintendent and expert cannot be ordered away. Of the other five, three were British subjects, who had lived in the United States and worked there,
