\$5,000 SOUGHT \$200 GRANTED

Miss Marshall, of Craig Street,
Sued the Street Railway
Company

For Damages for Injuries Received—
She Was Thrown From Her Wheel
by a Rail Elevated Above the Road.

An action brought by Miss Estella Marshall against the London Street Railway Company for \$5,000 damages, was commenced in the court of assizes yesterday afternoon. Miss Marshall resides on Craig street, South London, and on the morning of July 3 last was riding her bicycle on Ridout street south. On crossing the street railway tracks immediately south of Victoria bridge, she was thrown from her wheel and severely injured. The rails at this point were raised about an inch above the level of the roadbed, and it was held, were particularly dangerous on account of being grooved. Miss Underwood, a friend of Miss Marshall, was riding ahead of the plaintiff when the accident occurred, but did not witness it. George C. Gibbons, Q.C., and Gunn appeared for the plaintiff and Hellmuth & Ivey for the defendants. Mr. A. E. Passmore was the only eye-witness called. Mr. Hellmuth made many objections to Mr. Passmore's description of the accident, and the objections were sustained. Mr. Gibbons called City Engineer Graydon to show that there had been a failure on the part of the company to keep their track allowance in proper repair. During the examination of Mr. Graydon Chief Justice Armour said, "You are more particular about the street railway company in this city than in any other place I know of. I don't know why it is."

Mr. Gibbons—You don't know the street railway company, my lord. Miss Marshall is still suffering greatly from the injuries she received, but she bore up well in the witness box under the severe cross-examination of Mr. Hellmuth. Of the accident she could remember nothing. She was unconscious for four or five hours after it, and suffered from concussion of the brain. The most serious result of the accident was a large bruise, as a result of which necrosis is feared. Miss Marshall's physician said her complete recovery was not probable.

This morning the jury viewed the scene of the accident and arrived at the courtroom at 9:50. The counsel spent the time from the opening of the court at 9 a.m. until the arrival of the jury arguing about precedents, and the chief justice was gradually being waited in by law books.

Engineer Moore was the first witness called for the defense. He said the average height of the tracks about the roadbed where the accident occurred was not more than half an inch. The physicians for the company gave their evidence, which was largely opposed to that of the plaintiff's physicians.

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Mr. Hellmuth, in his address to the jury, said the plaintiff should have waited before bringing this action. He did not blame the plaintiff herself. It was a scheme, in which she was not the mover. She should have waited, he said, until the total extent of her injuries was known. He intimated that there was some reason for bringing the action at this time.

Mr. Gibbons spoke warmly. The counsel for the defendants had been a little bit spoiled, he said. What he had said about the position of the street railway company was uncalled for. All the trouble the street railway company had got into was brought about by their own carelessness, and by their own acts. If they chose to run fewer cars than necessary, the cars had to be run faster than they ought to be. If in their desire to make money they cut down the wages, and wouldn't repair the roads, they must expect accidents to occur. Mr. Gibbons incidentally mentioned that the company's stock was 180, and Mr. Hellmuth took him to task. Justice Armour said with a smile it was 170. Mr. Gibbons corrected him.

"Well," said his lordship, "it is not high enough for you to take stock in it, anyway, I suppose."

Mr. Gibbons replied that it was not low enough.

VERDICT FOR \$200.
The chief justice in his charge to the jury interpreted the clause of the street railway company's agreement bearing on the condition in which the 18-inch strip alongside the rail was to be kept, providing that it should be kept flush with the streets. There was no provision, he said, that it should be kept flush with the rails. He also emphasized the possibility of contributory negligence on the part of the plaintiff. She had never before fallen off her wheel, and people often when they became accustomed to "dangerous vehicles" were careless, he said.

The jury went out shortly after 11 o'clock, and returned at 1 with a verdict awarding the plaintiff \$200.

P. McCUE NON-SUITED.
An action brought by P. McCue, a drayman against the London Street Railway Company, for \$1,000 damages, was non-suited. J. M. McEvoy appeared for the plaintiff. The plaintiff alleged that on Sept. 11 last he attempted to cross the street railway tracks on Richmond street north, near Ann. He supposed an approaching street car would stop at the C. P. R. crossing, but was mistaken. His dray was struck and smashed. He was thrown out and had some ribs broken.

Another suit for damages. The case of Wood vs. the London Street Railway Company, an action for damages, is in progress this afternoon.
