WEEKLY REVIEW.
The only noticeable change in values of grain this week is an advance in oats and wheat. The former only advanced 10c, but the latter went up 20c to 30c. Oats moved up in response to a keen demand and light offerings, and wheat advanced under an increase in the number of competitors for the stuff. Receipts were somewhat better, the loss was \$1.10 to \$1.12 for ordinary to good, and \$1.10 for extra nice white.

Peas remain unchanged in value, and very little business was done. Corn—Receipts light; sales at 80c for flat.

Barley brought 80c to 82c for feeding samples; business small.

Rye nominal.

Buckwheat was very scarce, and sold at \$1 per cwt.

Beans sold all the way from \$1.05 to \$1.35 per bushel, according to quality.

Dressed hogs sold from \$6.00 to \$6.25 per 100 pounds for choice, and from \$5.75 to \$6.00 for heavy. Receipts were fairly good and the demand steady.

Live hogs had a peculiar experience this week. Some days the shippers were out of the market altogether, and today the report goes that competition has become so keen that \$5.00 is being offered for Monday. Buyers say the meat market does not warrant this price. The conclusion is that the dealers are running each other, and that the advance is only temporary.

Sales of young pigs ranged from \$3.50 to \$4.00 a pair for light.

Hay receipts were heavy and prices easy at \$3.00 to \$3.00. Demand steady.

CHICAGO, Feb. 20.—All the grain markets received a set-back today, the strength of corn advancing.

under a pressure of long stuff showing profits. Wheat was depressed by weak cables and poor demand, and closed 1/4c to 1/2c lower. Corn declined 1/4c to 1/2c, and oats 1/4c to 1/2c. Provisions closed irregular, a shade lower to 2 1/2c higher. Primary receipts were placed at 481,000 bushels. Minneapolis and Duluth receipts were 42 cars, against 403 last week and 479 a year ago. Chicago receipts were 70 cars. Export clearance of wheat at the docks amounted to 454,000 bushels. The seaboard reported 12 loads taken for export. Sales here for shipment amounted to 100,000 bushels. Receipts tomorrow—Wheat, 55 cars; corn, 490 cars; oats, 180 cars; hogs, 28,000 head.

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WOODMEN OF THE WORLD

Annual Reports of the Order's Head Officers.

The Year 1899 Was the Best in the History of This Flourishing Fraternal Society.

The head camp of the Woodmen of the World opened in the Duffield block at 2 o'clock this afternoon. About 100 delegates were present. The annual reports of the officers were especially gratifying.

In his report, Mr. C. C. Hodgins, the head consul commander, said: I desire to welcome you to our annual legislative meeting, wherein you will have an opportunity of hearing the various reports of our officers, examining into the conditions and requirements of the order, and enacting such legislation as in your wisdom you may deem advisable. A large amount of legislative work will engage your attention, most of which is of great importance to the welfare of the order, and to which I trust you will give your most careful consideration, so that you may be guided by clear business principles. Any member who has a personal motive, with an eye single to the future welfare of the order and your fellow sovereigns.

I am pleased to be again able to report a year of progress, not only in the cession of members and in increase of assets, but I feel justified in saying, in improved management, better organization, and more system, begetting greater confidence by the public, higher esteem for our order, and satisfaction with the ability and integrity of your executive.

He advised strengthening the hands of the executive. "Often circumstances arise for which no provision is made in the bylaws, and as your executive has not the power of legislation, we are handicapped and placed at such a disadvantage that the order suffers thereby."

He suggested also making the offices of head clerk and head physician non-elective but appointed by the executive. In speaking of matters arising for which no provision is made in the bylaws, he said: "I beg leave to draw your attention to the fact that a number of our members are now serving in the public, high esteem for our order, and satisfaction with the ability and integrity of your executive."

Two delegates from the head camp attended the meeting of the sovereign camp held at Memphis last year, and made arrangements whereby the liability to the sovereign camp for the expenses of incorporation have been wiped out, and a very favorable arrangement whereby the use of ritual and fraternal connection are maintained.

The purchase of \$12,600 county of Middlesex, Ontario, during twenty years, and bearing interest at the rate of 3 1/2 per cent, payable half yearly, was commended. Sov. Wm. Haworth, having resigned as head organizer, his position had been filled by the accession of Sov. T. B. Bole, a past supreme secretary of the Home Circle. Sov. Bole, with Sovs. Miller, Graves and the pioneer, Ramplin, now make up our organizing staff, he said, and any order might well be proud of such a group of conscientious, energetic and untiring organizers as were now so successfully pressing the claims of the C. O. W. O. W. on the attention of the Canadian public.

Mr. C. C. Fitzgerald, the head clerk, said: "It affords me great pleasure to submit my annual report for the year ending 31st December, 1899. From a consideration of the various reports submitted, it will be easy to ascertain that the order is in a flourishing condition; the year 1899 has been the best in its history. The growth, although not rapid in the extreme, has been steady and healthy; the class of members secured appears to be of the better; the risks well selected, while the lapses are less, the death rate lower; the receipts greater, losses less, and balance to the credit of the order, funds more than at the end of any previous year."
