Joseph Cake and Albert Broughton appeared in the clothes of two colors that distinguish residents at the jail, and they were very much attached to each other by steel bracelets. CITY CHURCH CIRCLES

And Notes of Interest in the Religious Community.

Rev. Mr. Seaborn's Return—The Jesuit Fathers' Mission—Rev. John Philp.

"I thank you, dear brethren, for the very great kindness you have shown me; I shall ever feel it to the end of my days." These words were uttered by Rev. W. M. Seaborn, rector of St. Matthew's Church, Sunday morning as he concluded his first sermon to his flock since his return from a six-months' sojourn in England. Continuing he said: "And I thank you for the kindness you have shown to mine during my absence. The church wardens have done their duty so well and I believe every friend has, I do come back feeling grateful that I am among my people. I have been in large churches but in none that I love more than St. Matthew's."

At St. Joseph's Church, Clinton, on Tuesday morning, Bishop O'Connor, of London, erected the stations of the cross.

The Dean of Huron denies that Rev. Mr. Taylor, of the diocese of Montreal, has been offered the curacy of St. Paul's Cathedral here. The news was published in the Evangelical Churchman, the leading Anglican organ.

Rev. J. J. Smith, B.A., of Toronto, preached anniversary sermons Sunday to the Askin Street Methodist congregation and addressed the Sunday school in the afternoon. An appeal was made for a special collection of \$500, and it was very effective.

Harper's Weekly a week or two ago had a group portrait of the House of Bishops of the Canadian General Synod (Anglican).

Rev. Principal Miller, of Huron College, London, took Dr. Johnston's duty at Holy Trinity, Welland, on a recent Sunday. The Welland Tribune speaks in the highest terms of his sermons, and expresses the hope that he will soon visit Welland again.

Rev. John Philp, M.A., D.D., a former pastor of the Queen's Avenue Methodist Church, addressed large congregations at the Dundas Center Church Sunday morning and evening. His evening sermon was especially notable, and dealt with the beauty, power and influence of the Bible. Every year, he said, brought the Bible nearer to the human heart. Here was a book that had lasted for 40 centuries—every century adding to its glory and magnificence. It had been translated into more languages than any other ten books together. Some men said the Bible was behind the age. Yes, as Horace Bushnell said, it was behind this age, and all ages, just as the wind was behind the sail, waiting the ship to the eternal shore.

Rev. Canon Davis preached missionary sermons in Mitchell Sunday. He is a brother of Mayor Davis, of that town, and Rev. Mr. Crisp, and the Dean of Huron occupied his pulpit here.

Rev. Dr. Johnson, whose travels through Africa and whose recent book has created so much attention, and who will lecture shortly in the First Presbyterian Church, has two brothers members of that congregation.

Rev. J. W. Annis preached especially to young men in Queen's Avenue Methodist Church Sunday night.

A parlor social under the auspices of the young people of King Street Presbyterian Church will be held on Friday night at the residence of Mr. Grant, King street east.

The elders of the King Street Presbyterian Church are seriously considering the advisability of enlarging the structure by the addition of a gallery. The congregation has grown rapidly since the induction of the new pastor, Rev. Mr. Robertson.

Rev. A. Findlay, "the missionary bishop" of the Algoma district, presented the claims of that region Sunday morning and evening at the Park Avenue and St. Andrew's Presbyterian Churches respectively.
