DESTRUCTIVE WINTER STORM

Coast of New England, Nova Scotia and Newfoundland Lashed by the Waves—Many Wrecks—Several Lives Lost.

Boston, Dec. 5.—Another southern storm has swept over New England and gone the way of all such disturbances, straight off to the northeast, and like hundreds of its energetic predecessors, left death and destruction in its wake.

Yesterday's gale is tonight threatening the waters off Nova Scotia and Newfoundland, preparatory to making a stirring descent upon the European steamer track, so that its destructive history is not yet fully complete. Just what it accomplished in this line in New England and particularly along the coast south of Boston can be summed up as follows:

Five Gloucester fishermen drowned. Six coasting schooners, complete wrecks. Nine vessels sunk. Eight schooners ashore and eleven others more or less injured through collision and loss of gear.

ON LAND.

The usual amount of damage occurred on land, buildings being blown down, telegraph wires prostrated and some delays on railroads in the northern portion through heavy snows.

While the storm was very severe along the entire New England coast, shipping north of this point seemed to have suffered more than those off the south shore and Cape Cod; in fact, no wrecks occurred on the latter's dreaded sands.

Salem harbor proved a bad trap for seven or eight sailing craft, while on the rugged Maine shore were dashed half a dozen other crafters. At Portsmouth the two-masted fishing schooner Mary A. Brown, of Gloucester, went ashore at Hampton Beach, and the five men on board were drowned. The vessel is a total wreck.

PLENTY OF SNOW IN MONTREAL. Montreal, Dec. 6.—Trains arriving are considerably delayed on account of the big storm. Montreal does not seem to have suffered as much as places further south. There is as much snow here now as there was two months later last winter.

STRIKE OF SERVANTS

May Start in New York—They Want Better Wages, Better Food and Better Housing.

New York, Dec. 6.—A strike of servant girls on Manhattan Island is imminent, according to Mrs. St. Justin Beale, who is planning a servant girls' union. Three hundred domestics, she says, stand ready to stop work as soon as the union is formed and demand better conditions. The union, she says, is to be organized tonight by Herman Robinson, general organizer for the American Federation of Labor.

"I have always taken great interest in servant girls," Mrs. Beale said, "and I find, with a few exceptions, they are badly fed, badly housed and overworked."

Kingston, Ont., Dec. 6.—The request of Kingston laborers that non-union men be not employed on city work was referred to the board of works. The board, in view of several unfinished sewers, decided that for the next week unionism would be recognized and objectionable non-unionists kept away.

Louisville, Ky., Dec. 6.—The opening of the 29th annual convention of the American Federation of Labor takes place at Music Hall today.

UNCLE SAM'S PENSION ROLL. New York, Dec. 6.—Secretary of the Interior Hitchcock says: "The pension roll for the coming year will call for the expenditure of about \$142,000,000, against \$138,000,000 for the year just closing. There are not less than 1,000,000 on the roll now, and these are being added to by recent legislation."

BOYS ASPHYXIATED. Picton, Ont., Dec. 6.—Two sons of Abram Drummond, of this place, Wesley and Ernest, aged 9 and 18 respectively, were asphyxiated by gas from a stove. The discovery was made about 7 o'clock last evening by A. Clarke and E. Trumpour, who were on their way to the Liberal committee rooms, which are in the same building.

BLACKMAIL CHARGED. Toronto, Ont., Dec. 6.—The friends of Mr. Ross Cameron, who was arrested for an alleged offense committed under the Charlton act, on a complaint preferred by the caretaker of Little Trinity Church on behalf of his little daughter, claim that the case is nothing but a blackmailing conspiracy. Mr. Cameron was arraigned at the police court, and the case was remanded till Tuesday next, bail in \$1,000 being granted. Mr. Cameron is a son of the late John Hillard Cameron, and has hitherto been known as a man of the highest character.

HENDRIE STOCK SALE. Toronto, Dec. 6.—At Grand's yesterday morning 21 horses, chiefly brood mares and young stock, from Mr. William Hendrie's Valley Farm, were sold. Most of them were sold as saddle horses, and the prices brought were fair. Some of the sales were prices were: Dream, b.m., in foal, E. C. PRINCE IN A PRISON CELL

Diabolical Murderer in Finely Furnished Dungeon.

A Measure of Religious Freedom That Does Not Suit the German Government—Kipling Going to the Cape.

Berlin, Dec. 6.—An immense sensation has been created throughout the length and breadth of Germany by the extraordinary favors granted in the case of Prince Prosper von Arenberg, of the formerly reigning house of that name, who has been sentenced to fifteen years' penal servitude for a particularly atrocious murder of a half-breed official in the German colonies on the West Coast of Africa.

The prince, who is only brother of the Duke of Arenberg, formerly king of Meppen, there being but the life of the duke's infant son between the prince and the family honors, first of all cut down the unfortunate official with his sword, then fired three bullets into his prostate body with a revolver, finishing him up by poking his riding stick into the gaping wound of the dying man.

The prince after his conviction and sentence here at Berlin was conveyed to the military penitentiary at Hanover, not in the ordinary prison car, but by special train, and orders have been given that he is to be addressed by all the prison officials as "Your Highness," that he is to be allowed to furnish his cell himself, and to procure his meals from an outside caterer, and that not only is he to be exempt from the ordinary prison regulations, but that he is to be permitted to select himself the kind of "hard labor" he will do.

RELIGIOUS FREEDOM. Berlin, Dec. 6.—In the reichstag, the imperial chancellor, Count von Buelow, informed the Centrists that the bill in regard to the free exercise of religion was not acceptable to the federal government, while respecting the convictions whereon it was based, saw in the proposal an intention to restrict the constitutional independence of the states in matters reserved for their individual legislations.

Major Wood, of the Canadian Mounted Police, has collected \$900,000 of mining duties, which would indicate that the Klondike output this season was \$9,000,000, but it is really estimated at \$20,000,000.

The Ridgewood power house, owned by the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company, was totally destroyed by fire last night, causing a loss of \$150,000, and a tie-up of street cars, lasting over two hours.

An epidemic of suicides has broken out in Panama, a student of the Polytechnic School, the proprietor of the Hotel Germania, and Jonas Kestler, treasurer of the American Club, killing themselves in one week.

At Evansville, Ind., one life was lost and several persons were injured in a fire early on Wednesday, which destroyed the structural iron works of George L. Meaker and Loewenthal's commission houses. Loss estimated at \$110,000. The killed and injured are firemen.

Nearly 16,000 tons of potato starch are turned out annually in the United States. The potatoes used for starch are the small and injured ones of the crop. Sixty bushels of them yield a barrel of starch.

MARRIED A BARON. London, Dec. 6.—Baron Herman Speck von Stollberg, formerly secretary of the German embassy at Washington and recently appointed consul-general for Germany at Calcutta, was married quietly yesterday at St. George's Church, Hanover square, to Miss Lillian May Leachman, of Louisville, Ky. The mother and two sisters of the bride were present. Mr. Joseph H. Choate, the United States ambassador, supported the bridegroom.

KIPLING GOING TO THE CAPE. London, Dec. 6.—Mr. Rudyard Kipling will sail for Cape Town Saturday, and will remain several months in South Africa recruiting his health.

A SHORT SPEECH. London, Dec. 6.—The Queen's speech today will be the shortest on record. It will consist of a single sentence announcing that parliament has been summoned to provide supplies for the army. The foreign relations, which are not touched on in this laconic message, will be fully dealt with in the speech opening the February session.

FOUGHT TWO HOURS. Manila, Dec. 6.—A dispatch has been received from Gen. Funston, giving an account of two hours' fight in the woods of Santo Domingo between an American force and 300 rebels commanded by Sandico. The American force, consisting of thirty native scouts, the Carabala, who retreated, leaving on the field sixteen men killed, including the rebel leader, Aguilar, and an American negro. Not one of Fernigan's men was wounded.

KHAKI IS DOOMED. Berlin, Dec. 3.—For the new winter uniforms which the government has ordered for the troops, the khaki color is discarded for a new color, termed "field gray." This is a light greenish-gray, with a certain proportion of white, which looks better than khaki and is equally undistinguishable in the field.

CABLE NOTES. It is again stated in English military circles that General Sir Charles Warren, of Spion Kop fame, succeeds Lord Seymour in command at Halifax.

A dispatch received at Berlin from Von Metzinger, the German minister to Morocco, for the payment of the three principal claims of injured Germans and the punishment of the offenders, have been yielded to by the sultan.

During the debate in the second chamber at The Hague, the premier, Dr. Pierson, declared he could not at present foresee the psychological moment when the Netherlands would be able to propose arbitration between Great Britain and the Transvaal.

TWENTY-NINE DROWNED. London, Dec. 5.—Storms have been sweeping over the British coasts. The steamer Rossgill, of Plymouth, founded off the island of Jersey, and only 11 persons out of 40 people on board were saved.

Late on Saturday night a fight took place at Ridgeway between George Cowell and Dutch Hermon, which may have a serious ending, as Cowell was quite seriously stabbed during the row. After they had fought for some time, they were parted by some onlookers, and Cowell went home, but was followed by Hermon, whom he ordered off his lot. Hermon refused to go, and they again clinched, and it was during this that Cowell was stabbed. The wound was at first considered quite serious, but it is now thought the will recover, unless blood poisoning sets in. Hermon appears to have made good his escape.

News in a Nutshell.

Skaguay is now connected by telegraph with Eagle, which is 100 miles from Dawson.

The United States treasury contains \$94,615,573 in gold over and above the \$150,000,000 gold reserve.

At Vancouver, B.C., W. T. Wilson, a commercial man, was found dead on his own veranda on Tuesday morning.

A disease, which it is feared is smallpox, has appeared among the Indians on Crooked Lake reservation, near Fort Ellice.

John Drew, aged 67, of Paterson, N. J., a wealthy retired horseman, died in New York on Tuesday night of heart failure.

The question of Woodstock's incorporation as a city will be submitted to the vote of the electors at the January elections.

Fire in the upper storerooms of Haywood Bros. and the Wakefield Rattan Company at Boston, early on Wednesday, caused a loss of \$109,000.

What is known as the Ridgewood power house, owned by the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company, was totally destroyed by fire Tuesday night. Loss, \$150,000.

Heavy snow at Utica and Syracuse, N. Y., on Tuesday demolished electric light and telegraph wires. Two persons were killed by coming in contact with live wires at Utica.

The second oldest practicing dentist in Detroit, Dr. Joseph Lathrop, sen., died of pneumonia Tuesday night, at his residence, Edmund Place, after a brief illness, aged 66 years.

The Manitoba government, it is said, is negotiating with the Canadian Northern directors, who probably will take over the Northern Pacific branches and make western extensions.
