Sir Wilfrid Laurier Addressed 10,000 People at Strathroy Middlesex and Lambton Electors Honor Canada's First Citizen

"My days cannot be very long now, but whether they are long or short. I shall ever treasure as the most holy thing in my life, if I may say so, the confidence which has been placed in me by men who are not of my own kith and kin. (Cheers.) But, though they were not of my own kith and kin, they know that their rights were just as sacred to me as the rights of my own people. (Cheers.) I have endeavored to maintain that principle; to demonstrate that the Liberal party is broad enough and Liberal principles large enough to give shelter and an equal share of justice and liberty to all men, no matter what their creed or origin.
