REV. FATHER AYLWARD'S TRIBUTE TO FR. FALLON

Rector of St. Peter's Refers to the New Bishop of London.

At the high mass celebrated in St. Peter's Cathedral yesterday the Rev. Father Aylward spoke in a most feeling manner of the appointment of the Rev. Father Fallon to the bishopric of London. "For some length of time," said the speaker, "the position has been vacant, and priests and people have been praying the Almighty that he would send them one who would be worthy of the sacred trust. And, indeed," he continued, "the prayers had been answered in the fullest measure. The Diocese of London had been singularly fortunate in the bishops who have presided over it. They have been a blessing to Holy Church, and to the community at large. The one who has now been honored will prove a worthy successor. His reputation has preceded him, and we will have in our midst as our father and our guide, a priest after God's own heart; one endowed with a splendor of intellect, one whose eloquence of speech will be devoted to the spread of God's kingdom on earth; one whose abounding charity, whose kindness of disposition and whose warm-heartedness will be a benediction to his flock. In every corner of the diocese there awaits the new bishop a sincere and enthusiastic welcome. He will have in abundance the love, the esteem, and the obedience of all flock—priests and people, who are remarkable for their loyalty to the mother church, and who show an abiding interest in her welfare."
