GODERICH MURDER

Continued From Page One.

"Frank Jardine, Reg Love, Lizzie Anderson, and others I didn't know," said the witness.

"Did you know Lizzie Anderson by sight?"

"No."
Witness remembered how she was dressed, wearing a short jacket, black and white, or grey. He thought the man with her was young Jardine, he said. He could not identify the party, though he judged the time to be about 8:45 when he met the party in the poultry house.

Reggie Love, 13 years of age, said he knew the Jardines well, especially Frank. He saw Ed. on Tuesday night in the poultry hall with a young lady, whom he recognized as Lizzie Anderson. He did not know the time, but saw the Tiedeman family there then.

"You are quite sure it was Edward Jardine?"

"Yes."
"You are quite sure it was Lizzie Anderson?"

"Yes."
They stood in the same place while witness was there. He was sure they were standing together, apart from the others.

Ray Steele said he knew Ed Jardine, but not Frank. He knew Lizzie Anderson. He saw both parties, Ed Jardine and Lizzie Anderson, the night of the tragedy, at the fair grounds, about 9:30. He was positive about the time. They were near the peanut stand, not far from the little booth where witness stood.

A Sensation.
The statement caused a considerable sensation, as it was thought the girl had not been seen so late, but witness was positive as to the time.

Ten minutes later, said the witness, Jardine and the girl had gone from that place.

Mrs. Anna McDonald testified she was at the fair grounds on Tuesday evening, the second day of the show. Her little girl and Margaret Leonard were also at the show. She joined Mr. McDonald in the building about 10:10 p.m. The little girls had taken Mrs. McDonald to the grounds and shown

her where they (the girls) had seen Edward Jardine and Lizzie Anderson talking together outside the building about 10 o'clock, in about the same place that the witness Ray Steele saw them.

Mrs. Capt. McLeod was the next witness. She said she knew the Jardine family well, living next door. She was at the fair on the night in question. She saw the performance and left for home at 9:55, after having seen the Jardine party at the fence near the track.

Capt. McLeod corroborated this, and fixed the time definitely when the performance ended.

Margaret Leonard, a girl about 13, said she saw Ed Jardine and Lizzie Anderson about 10 o'clock together in the place where they were seen by Steele.

Kathleen McDonald was with Margaret Leonard and corroborated her evidence.

The Post-Mortem.
Dr. Macklin, one of the post-mortem physicians, then took the stand. He testified having made the autopsy on the body, assisted by Dr. Gallow and Dr. Gunn.

Dr. Gallow then read a report of the post-mortem. Scratches were found on the back of the girl. The majority of the bruises on the body were made after death. They found a wound in the neck which had severed all the ligaments, and a small stab wound above the cut. The clothing examined showed the hat to be stained with blood, as were the handkerchief and hair ribbon.

Burrs were found on parts of the clothing, especially the stockings. All the clothing was stained and soaked with blood, and was cut considerably, in fact, it was certain all the clothing was cut off after death. The blow on the head was caused by the knuckles of a hand presumably, and was a very severe blow, causing unconsciousness.

Crowd Excited.
The crowd listened eagerly to the medical evidence, becoming quite excited at times. Drs. Gunn and Macklin concurred with the report.

Hugh McGuire was the next witness, but as the crown attorney said his evidence was very important and lengthy, his hearing was not taken.

William Brindley then took the stand. Ed. Jardine had been in his shooting gallery early on the evening of the night of the murder. About 9:40 the same evening he saw Jardine and Hugh McGuire having a friendly tussle, and McGuire, a larger man than Jardine, could not down him. Jardine appears almost a complete cripple, and this evidence produced somewhat of a sensation.

Witness said Jardine paid for his shots, which contradicts Jardine's former evidence, to the effect that he had the shots free. He paid 15 cents in the afternoon and 10 cents at night. The object of this testimony was to discredit the statement of Ed. Jardine that he had bought supper for the dead girl, as, according to his evidence he had only 15 cents, after paying his admission to the fair.

Hear Cry of Distress.
Mrs. Dan Buchanan next testified she had heard men talking on the night of the murder near the show grounds fence, near where she lives. She heard a woman's cry of distress, and then a man laughed and then there was a weaker cry.

Mrs. Chas. Ross, who lives two houses from the scene of the murder, heard the sound of a cry that night, a pitiful wail, very near her house, presumably on the road past the scene of the crime. The time was shortly before 2 a.m.

John Salisbury said he passed the house where the murder was committed shortly after 1 o'clock on the night in question, but heard no noise or outcry.

The inquest was then adjourned till this morning.

**MISCREANT TURNED
IN FIRE ALARM**

Fire Department Given a Useless Run Last Night.

The fire department had a run to the corner of Simcoe and Wellington streets last night at 10:45 o'clock, to satisfy the curiosity of some miscreant who turned in a false alarm. The combination wagon of No. 3 company had a hard time. When crossing Richmond and Horton street it became mired in an excavation made by the London Street Railway Company, who are finishing their tracks at this point. It took the firemen some time to get the rig out.
