

AID BY PUBLIC MONEY WESTERN UNIVERSITY

Hon. Dr. Roche's Address on Friday When Degree Was Conferred.

The Hon. Wm. J. Roche, Winnipeg, ecretary of state of Canada, was elected as the first graduate of the estern University to receive the henorary degree LL.D., under the new constitution of the university. In mominating the secretary of state to Chef Justice Meredith, chancellor of the university for this degree, Dr. McCallum made mention of the fact that the Hon. W. J. Roche was a member of the first graduating class of the Western University in the faculty of medicine. During his twenty-eight years' residence in the Canadian west the member for Winnipeg has spent fifteen years in public life.

After the conferring of the degree Dr. Roche addressed in brief form the faculty and the men students of the enerary degree LL.D., under the new After the conferring of the degree Dr. Roche addressed in brief form the faculty and the men students of the Western University. He expressed his great appreciation of the degree in that few public men are selected for euch honors. Dr. Roche is a believer in the resources of Canada, and he strongly recommended Western Canada in preference to the Western United States, both from an individual and from a national point of view. "Young men and young women of Canada," he said, "should not seek their homes under a foreign flag."

The secretary of state complimented the university on the men which it had sent out as graduates, and bespoke a word, which was enthusiastically received, for a greater support for the university, both in men and in money. It was his idea that apart from local support the university in London might profitably receive the aid of public money without injuring the other universities of the province. Education is in his opinion the making of the characters in the nation's individuals which will compet the respect and the admiration of other nations.
