MILITIA CALLED OUT IN EASTERN RIOTS

Foreign Operatives On Strike Cause Serious Trouble Around Mills of Lawrence, Mass.

[Canadian Press,1

Lawrence, Mass., Jan. 15. - Disorders before the gates of the great texquent and menacing this morning that two companies of militia were called from the armory to assist the police n controlling the turbulent mobs of foreign operatives. The uproar at the mill gates was so great that seven of the big plants were shut down. Several shots were fired in the air by the police and a number of arrests were

During the raids on the mills a dozen or more operatives were injured, but none seriously.

At 10 a.m. it was estimated that nearly 30,000 hands were idle, half of whom are actually on strike and the thers forced out by the stoppage of the machinery.

The outbreaks, which occurred first n Friday last, when an infuriated mob stormed several of the mills, and injered employees and property, are due cut in the working time from 56 to 54 Irish. The two races blended. hours a week, by a new state law governing establishments where women and minors are employed. The mills closed are the Wood, Ayer and Washington.

ANGLO-SAXON RACE DOMINATES WORLD

Dr. Driver Says They Control Wealth, Industry and Progress of the Earth.

INCREASE OF 620 PERCENT

Men of the Blood Have Not Deter iorated, But Control Destinies of All Nations.

"The Anglo-Saxon and the Future Rulership of the World" was the title of an address before a large audience in the Auditorium on Sunday afternoon by Dr. Driver, of the People's Church, McVicker's Theatre, Chicago. Dr. Driver is a big man, both physically and mentally, possessed of a strong and virile voice, which in itself would command attention, and his stirring lecture was one of the best heard in the Auditorium for some

Dealing with a large subject, and one that required delicate handling, he held his audience in a strong grip during his discourse, not only by his rather eccentric style of speaking, but by his wonderful flow of words, and his splendid command of expression He also possesses a rare sense of humor, and all through his lecture his hearers were kept in a state of enjoyment by his whimsical expressions.

There was not an uninteresting moment in the whole two hours that Dr. Driver occupied the platform. He did not merely lecture on the subject, but he acted it as well. At times one would almost be led to believe that it was an interpretation of a play that was being given, instead of an ad-

dress. His lecture dealt with the Anglo-Saxon people, and the fact that in their hands the destinies of other nations lie. But who were the Anglo-Saxons? Then the Vikings of the north, the men of Charlemagne, had landed on the north shore of England, and had met the North German Saxons and the Irish, and were for the first time in their history defeated. Then the French came, when the Norman invasion of England was made, this being the severest invasion from which the Saxons suffered. This period is immortalized by the birth of parliamentary England, the time when the Magna Charta was drawn up. Then the wonderful blending process took place. The Irish and the North German Saxons intermarried, and their offspring intermarried with Vikings. Then the South German Saxon farmer lemocrat absorbed the French nobility, who came to England during the time of William the Conqueror.

What Is Owed the Races.

Without the infusion of the Irish blood, England would never have produced her Chaucer, her Shakespeare, her Milton and numerous others.
