MILITIA CALLED OUT IN EASTERN RIOTS

Foreign Operatives On Strike Cause Serious Trouble Around Mills of Lawrence, Mass.

[Canadian Press.]

Lawrence, Mass., Jan. 15.—Disorder before the gates of the great textile mills of Lawrence became so frequent and menacing this morning that two companies of militia were called from the city to assist the police in controlling the turbulent mob of foreign operatives. The uproar at the mill gates was so great that seven of the big plants were shut down. Several shots were fired in the air by the police and a number of arrests were made.

During the raids on the mills a dozen or more operatives were injured, but none seriously.

At 10 a.m. it was estimated that nearly 30,000 hands were idle, half of whom are actually on strike and the others forced out by the stoppage of the machinery.

The outbreaks, which occurred first on Friday last, when an infuriated mob stormed several of the mills, and injured employees and property, are due to a general reduction in wages, necessitated, the manufacturers say, by a cut in the working time from 56 to 54 hours a week, by a new state law governing establishments where women and minors are employed.

The mills closed are the Wood, Ayer, and Washington.

Five Persons Reported Killed in Collision Near Newcastle, Pa.

THE MARCH ON PEKING

Chinese Revolutionaries Preparing to Capture the National Capital.

London, Jan. 15.—Preparations are under way by the revolutionaries for the march on Peking, according to special dispatches from Shanghai and Peking. Twelve thousand imperial troops are on the way to Chin Wang Tao and Lanchow to oppose the expected landing of revolutionaries.

A dispatch to the Daily Telegraph from Peking says that the demand of Russia for the railway concession in Mongolia was prompted by knowledge that the so-called American group was desirous of transferring the Chin Chow-Aigun Railway scheme, which failed to materialize, to a line from Kalgan to the Siberian frontier, which Russian never would permit.

ANGLO-SAXON RACE DOMINATES WORLD

Dr. Driver Says They Control Wealth, Industry and Progress of the Earth.

INCREASE OF 620 PERCENT

Men of the Blood Have Not Determined, But Control Destinies of All Nations.

"The Anglo-Saxon and the Future Rulership of the World" was the title of an address before a large audience in the Auditorium on Sunday afternoon by Dr. Driver, of the People's Church, McVicker's Theatre, Chicago. Dr. Driver is a big man, both physically and mentally, possessed of a strong and virile voice, which in itself would command attention, and his stirring lecture was one of the best heard in the Auditorium for some time.

Dealing with a large subject and one that required delicate handling, he did his audience in a strong grip during his discourse, not only by his rather eccentric style of speaking, but by his wonderful flow of words, and his splendid command of expression. He also possesses a rare sense of humor, and all through his lecture his hearers were kept in a state of enjoyment by his whimsical expressions.

Acts His Thoughts.

There was not an uninteresting moment in the whole two hours that Dr. Driver occupied the platform. He did not merely lecture on the subject, but he acted it as well. At times one would almost be led to believe that it was an interpretation of a play that was being given, instead of an address.

His lecture dealt with the Anglo-Saxon people, and the fact that in their hands the destinies of other nations lie. But who were the Anglo-Saxons? And to solve this question, Dr. Driver started at the beginning, away back to the time when the Irish were the aborigines of the British Isles, just as the Indians were the aborigines of America. He explained how the Saxons had come to England and settled down, after conquering the Irish. The two races blended.

Coming of the Normans.

Then the Vikings of the north, the men of Charlemagne, had landed on the north shore of England, and had met the North German Saxons and the Irish, and were for the first time in their history defeated. Then the French came, when the Norman invasion of England was made, this being the severest invasion from which the Saxons suffered. This period is immortalized by the birth of parliamentary England, the time when the Magna Charta was drawn up. Then the wonderful blending process took place. The Irish and the North German Saxons intermarried, and their offspring intermarried with Vikings. Then the South German Saxon farmer democrat absorbed the French nobility, who came to England during the time of William the Conqueror.

What is Owed the Races.

Without the infusion of the Irish blood, England would never have produced her Chaucer, her Shakespeare, her Milton, and numerous others. The French brought to England the blood that gave to the world, Homer, Cicero, Richelieu, Moliere, Louis the Magnificent, and Napoleon. From this infusion of French blood the Anglo-Saxon gets the love of literature, the theatre, gay social functions, splendor and the enthusiasm for sports.

"The Anglo-Saxon is pre-eminently a German race," continued Dr. Driver. "The so-called English are Saxons, with a Norman strain. The great gulf stream of your blood is Germanic. There is a little of Irish, Scotch, Danish, Swedish, Norwegian, French, and a wee bit of Spanish, Portuguese, Italian, Egyptian, and perhaps negro. And so the Anglo-Saxon absorbed the best blood of all these races, just as he himself represented the very best blood of Germany. I venture that the best blood in Canada is not in Prince Edward Island or Quebec, but in Toronto and London. Just as in the United States, the best blood is not in Boston or New York, but in California and Texas. All the best men come from the west, and not from the east."

Stands for Liberty.

"The Anglo-Saxon, wherever found, always stands for the elemental, fundamental, and essentials of religious liberty, and whatever liberty the world today enjoys, it is indebted to the Union Jack and the Stars and Stripes of the Anglo-Saxon world. The great God of all nations has committed to us the destinies of the whole human race."

Dr. Driver then went on to show the great value of money to humanity. He said that it was ridiculous to preach sermons against great wealth. He did it at one time, but now he is more wise. "Take the four richest men in the world," said Dr. Driver, "and you will find that they are virtuous. The world does not know all that they do."

FIRE VICTIM'S BODY FROZEN IN RUINS

Found in Kneeling Position Behind Steel Gate of the Equitable Life Building.

New York, Jan. 15.—The body of William Campion, the head watchman, who lost his life in the Equitable Life building fire of last Tuesday, was found on Sunday frozen in a kneeling position behind a great steel gate leading to the street from the vaults of the Mercantile Trust Company. A heavy steel beam from the roof of the vault pinned down the man's back, increased in a cast of ice, with the feet firmly frozen in a pedestal of icy debris, the entire body resembled a rough-hewn statue of marble.

It was the night's work of 60 men to remove the tons of ice-cemented ruins that hid the gate of the vault from view, and the day's work of wrecking experts to cut away the bars of the gate. While the work was going on two of the men saw, they say, far back in the ruins of the vault, the body of Francis Seider, another missing watchman, the location of which had not been definitely known.

FATHER ST. DENIS DEAD

Prominent Educationalist of the Roman Catholic Church Dies.

Montreal, Jan. 15.—The death occurred last evening at the Hotel Dieu, of Rev. Father St. Denis, a prominent educationalist in the Roman Catholic Church, who was for 25 years director of the Archbishop's Academy in this city. His Grace, the Archbishop, visited the late Father an hour before his death and administered the last rites of the church to him. The deceased was nearly 70 years of age, and in addition to his connection with the academy held at various times similar positions in the Mount St. Louis College of Montreal, the Commercial College of Quebec, the La Salle Institute of Toronto, and the Catholic College of Halifax.

PARAGUAY'S REVOLT.

Montevideo, Uruguay, Jan. 15.—Dispatches received here today from Paraguay report that the rebel leaders have announced that if they are victorious in the fight against the Government they will not recognize any financial agreements which have been concluded by the Government, which is still vested in the capital by the revolutionaries.
