BOUGHT GEMS FOR JUNK

Alleged Burglar Says He Paid \$500 for \$20,000 Worth. New York, May 22.—Jewelry and diamonds valued at \$20,000 have been found by the police in a safe deposit vault of the Harlem branch of the Colonial Trust Company, which was rented by Bert Curtis, the alleged burglar of the "Beau Brummel" type, who was arrested last Sunday. Curtis, who has refused to make a statement, accompanied the police to the Colonial Trust Company, where scores of men and women, whose homes have been robbed within the last year, had gathered to identify the hidden plunder. "I bought that junk from another man," Curtis said, as the detectives removed the five packages from the strong box. "I paid \$500 for the whole bunch of it."

Several wealthy men and women, including J. P. Morgan, Jun., have reported losses by robbery recently.

FATAL GANG FIGHT.

New York, May 22.—Three men were wounded, one fatally, in a war between rival gangs which broke out in a crowded ballroom in Williamsburg early this morning. A rattle of revolver shots at midnight interrupted the merriment and caused a wild rush for the exits, in which a number of the 1,000 persons present were painfully injured. When the smoke cleared three men were stretched on the floor. David Levy, 20 years old, was mortally wounded; his brother, Lewis, had bullet wounds in the hands. Only one arrest was made.

STOCK AND CROP CENSUS

[Special to The Advertiser.] Ottawa, May 23.—A bulletin of the census and statistics office, issued today, makes the following report on the crops and live stock of Canada: The area sown to winter wheat last fall was reported as 1,097,900 acres, of which 737,200 acres were in Ontario and 360,700 acres in Alberta. From reports of correspondents at the end of April, it is estimated that about 21.50 per cent of this area has been winter killed, the proportion being 28.72 per cent in Ontario and 38.50 per cent in Alberta. This represents a total deduction from the area sown of about 345,000 acres (320,000 acres in Ontario and 116,000 acres in Alberta). The average condition of winter wheat on April 30 was 72.62 of a standard (71.24 per cent in Ontario and 76.80 per cent in Alberta). From these figures it is calculated that the yield per acre from winter wheat in 1912 is likely to be about 20 bushels per acre, or 12 per cent less than the average yield of the three years, 1909-11, viz., 23.33 bushels per acre, provided that average conditions prevail between now and harvest.

In the Maritime Provinces spring seeding on April 30 had only begun here and there, most of the ground being still under snow. Very little progress had been made by the same date in Quebec, the amount of seeding done

JURY SELECTED FOR TRIAL OF MRS. QUINN

Take Oath to Inflict the Death Penalty if the Woman Is Found Guilty.

Chicago, May 23.—Twelve men completing the panel to try Mrs. Jane Quinn, took oath this afternoon that they would inflict the death penalty on her if the evidence warranted the jury in finding her guilty of killing her husband, John Quinn. The case is being heard before Judge Pettit. Immediately after twelve men had been accepted, Assistant State Attorney Lowe began the opening statement for the state. The chief testimony given against her at the coroner's inquest was by Elmer Thorpe, the son of her husband, who for several years had sworn vengeance on his step-mother, it is declared.

Mrs. Quinn was married to a man named McDonald, and resided in this city about twenty years ago. Later McDonald died in Michigan. It is said, under mysterious circumstances.

LOVE BORN IN LAST 100 YEARS, HE SAYS

Declares That Ancient Regard For Women Was Solely Physical.

FEMALE ALWAYS HAD IT

In Olden Times Man Mastered the Weaker Sex, Now It Dominates the Male.

Vienna, Austria, May 22.—Emil Lucka, Austria's poet and philosopher, has been talking in Vienna about the nature of love. Lucka is the author of "Death and Life," "Isolde Whitehand" and several other semi-romantic, semi-philosophical works which show great insight and imaginative power.

He propounds the thesis that real love between the sexes is not a universal fact of nature, but has existed only in the last hundred years. Love is essentially a union of earthly and divine feelings, and that being so it is a modern product.

Lucka affirms that in ancient times spiritual love to woman was entirely unknown. Oriental love was physical and the idealized love of Plato was not love of woman at all, but only love of the good, beautiful and true.

When spiritual or intellectual love was invented, it also was not love in the modern sense. This was 1,500 years later, in the age of the troubadours and of the Renaissance. The love of the troubadours was only spiritual; it did not demand reciprocity and the lover was content and even happy with hopeless love.

Bases of Early Love.

The Italians of the age of Dante idealized love to women, but this merged in the Madonna cult and had nothing to do with modern love. Dr. Lucka says that at certain stages of the Renaissance the Madonna cult was in danger of ousting the Christ cult. This love was not the love of man to woman. So that while the ancient idealized only physical love, there was a stage in the later Middle Ages in which only an intellectual love was understood.

The real, or modern love, which is a combination of the two, began only at the time of Rousseau and the German romanticists. This love merges the sex-love of the Orientals and ancient Greeks and the pure, idealized love of the troubadours and of the Renaissance. In modern love there is no longer a limit between senses and soul. Personality, which is the essence of real love, unites the sexes, the sexes have been trying to transcend either his senses or his soul and to attain a homogeneous, personal love.

Woman Had It For Years.

Woman has not been dominated by man at no time has she been dominated by purely physical or purely spiritual love. She possessed all along the homogeneous love which man has had to fight for thousands of years in order to attain.

Lucka defines love as "essentially personal." It is the love of an individual, devoted to, devoted to, on the other hand, the stronger is a man's nature, the stronger is his desire to find what he wants in one person. The more intensely he feels, the harder it is for him to find it. The man with intense feelings is erotically differentiated and is, therefore, entirely bound up with one woman, and he cannot conceive finding a substitute for her.

The "love-death," says Lucka, is the highest final form of modern love. The ideal of the love-death springs from the fact that the perfection of the world always baffles the supremest love of man and woman.

Lovers seek death because death affords the ecstasy of solving world problems and world sorrows. Normally men set love and death apart, as they do marriage and funerals. They are the two poles of existence. But the supramental life should be its end. That is metaphysical eroticism.

A BLOW AT FREEDOM.

DR. CURTIS WILL HAVE A VERY BUSY TIME

Will Address Numerous Gatherings on the Playgrounds Movement.

Dr. Curtis, of Worcester, Mass., is preparing for a busy time, when he comes next week to speak on behalf of the playgrounds movement.

The dates for the meetings have not been definitely settled, but it is expected that the official programme will be announced on Saturday. He will speak to various organizations of all kinds.

Among the gatherings he will address are the McClary factory employees, York Street, National Council of Women, Grand Trunk employees, London Teachers' Association, Horticultural Society, Board of Education, Askin Street Methodist Church, Talbot Street Baptist Church, First Congregational Church, Mini-sterial Alliance, McClary foundry employees, (Chelsea Green), Mothers' Clubs, Canadian Club, V. M. C. A., Volunteer Workers, Separate School Board, public rally at which the Trades and Labor Council, Charities Organization Society, Humane Society and other organizations will be present.

Much interest is being manifested in his work, and it is expected that a great deal of good will result from his lectures.

TO PREVENT FIRES ALONG THE RAILWAYS

Commission Lays Down Rules Regarding Locomotive Handling.

Ottawa, May 23.—The railway commission today issued an order laying down the new regulations for fire protection along the lines of Canadian railways, made as a result of the recent hearings of the matter at which the railways, some of the provinces chiefly affected and the conservation committee were represented. The new regulations embody nearly all the recommendations of the conservation commission, and take the place of all previous orders of the board with respect to fires along the lines of railways.

The Regulations.

The regulations are, in effect, as follows: All coal-burning locomotives to be fitted with specified netting spark arrestors.

Locomotive ash pans to be specifically constructed with a view to preventing the escape of live coals. Railways companies to be required to provide locomotive inspectors at terminal and divisional points. Those inspectors to examine weekly the fire-boxes, etc., of each locomotive running into such divisional points. The records kept by these inspectors to be available for the chief of fire inspectors of the railway and of the commission.

The railway board to employ a chief fire inspector for the Dominion, who will be given wide powers in the matter of keeping railway right-of-way free from inflammable materials and or requiring the construction of proper fire guards. He shall also prepare each year a detailed statement for the measures that they will be required to take to prevent fires.

Will Be Liable.

The companies to be held liable for losses caused by their locomotives, where the regulations of the railway board have been disregarded.

On portions of railway lines where oil locomotives are used the regulations may be suspended.

Railway companies shall not burn lignite coal in their locomotives as fuel for transportation purposes unless otherwise ordered by the board.

Any fire starting within three hundred feet of a railway track shall be presumed to have been started by the railway, unless otherwise proved.

A fine of \$100 for railway companies and \$25 for their employees is fixed for contravention of any of the regulations.

Clyde Leavitt, forester of the conservation commission, and chief fire inspector of the railway commission, left this morning for British Columbia, where he will visit various railway lines and make provision for the enforcement of the new regulations.

STUDY INDIAN DIALECTS

Norwegian Explorers Use Phonography in Making Records.

Christiania, May 21.—The explorer Christian Leden and Harald Thaulow have just returned here from an expedition to Northern Canada, which was undertaken with the object of collecting phonographic records of the folk songs of the various Indian tribes and comparing them with those obtained in earlier expeditions to the Eskimos with the view of establishing how far was their common origin.

The largest tribe visited was the Crees, who number over 20,000. Their chief, Mantongik, was at first hostile, but after a few presents of tobacco and glass beads and after having been told that the explorers had been sent by the King of Norway to make his tribe famous he became more amenable to the wishes of the explorers. They brought back with them a most interesting collection of films and records of Indian life and music.

Leden will go in the fall to Greenland for further investigation in the spring of 1913, and a long final expedition to Northwest Canada which will extend for three years. He will visit tribes that have never been in contact with the whites.

BRITISH LADS ILL FED?

A Congress Going to Look into the Fare Supplier at Schools.

London, May 23.—From time immemorial it has been the dearest privilege of the British schoolboy to complain of his school meals, just as it is his father's time-honored custom to criticize the club chef. Now the National Food Reform Association is determined to rob the schoolboy of his pet grievance, and has summoned a congress on diet in schools.

Charles E. Hecht, the secretary of the association, declares that in schools "the food question is generally left to take care of itself, and the effect of this neglect is felt by the boys for the rest of their lives." He cites the result of a physical examination of 1,000 public school boys undertaken by Dr. Clement Duke, honorary consulting medical officer to Rugby School. The boys were between the ages of 13 and 15, and, without giving any specific details, Mr. Hecht declares that the results "are calculated to cause great alarm."

Acquired and preventable deformities, indicative of inferior assimilation and nutrition, are said to have been found among "this most favored class of boys," and the National Food Reform Association has determined to find out where the evil lies and correct it.

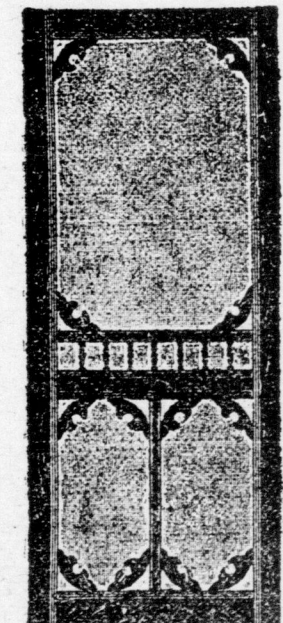
