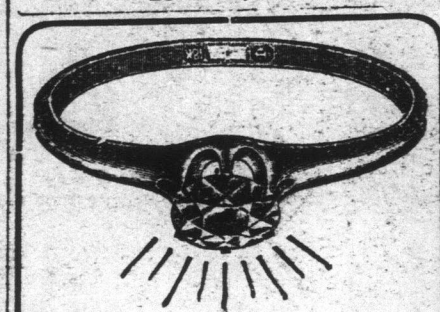
LONDON AND THE STRANGER.

What aspect of London is it that appeals to the foreigner? Mazzini had no fondness for London as a whole, but he loved of all things—the London fog! The whole city seems under a kind of spell, and reminds me of the Witches' Scene in 'Macbeth' or the Broctonberg or the Witch of Endor. And, years afterwards, when back in Italy, he recalls these same London fogs: "I think very often under these radiant skies of the London fogs, and always regretfully. Individually speaking, I was evidently intended for an Englishman."

ORIGIN OF PHILISTINES

Valuable Discoveries Made in Ancient City of Bethshemah.

London, Aug. 15.—The vexed question of the origin of the Philistines is expected to be solved shortly. A letter received in London announces that Dr. Duncan MacKenzie, director of the exploring party which went to Palestine in behalf of the Palestine Exploration Fund, has made discoveries of high historical importance in the ruins of the ancient city of Bethshemah, which he and a companion, Mr. Newton, explored. Pottery and other objects which were unearthed are believed to support the theory that the Philistines were emigrants from Crete. E. W. Masters, secretary of the exploration fund, writing from Bethshemah, July 24, gives the following details of the discoveries:

A high mound on which there were five prostrate pillars (masseboth) was recently unearthed, and what was probably an extremely early sanctuary or grotto was found underneath. It has not yet been opened up or explored. At the same time it is a grotto with the most primitive implements, for a great quantity of unbroken pottery (food and drink offerings) have been uncovered which date back to at least 1500 B. C. The natives were much excited over this discovery, and also the discovery of several huge wall paintings, which followed down a few feet will probably solve the problem of the water supply of this ancient walled city.

and that he made the timbering of the land pay for the clearing, cropping and building. He says he would not take \$10,000 for his property today. He has worked hard and deserves his success.

Van Trevel, a neighbor of Mr. Jibb, has just finished building a fine barn 45x100 feet. He has gone into mixed farming and sold several cars of hay last year. From eight acres he threshed 64 bushels of timothy seed, which was sold at \$7 per bushel, or a return of \$448 per acre. These prosperous conditions seem to prevail generally around Milberta, which is about ten miles north of New Liskeard.

Came in With \$7. Milton Irwin came to Temiskaming seven years ago. He landed in Cobalt with \$7 in his pocket and took a position with one of the mines. A year later he took a farm near Liskeard and has been so successful in clearing and cultivating it that he has just built a fine barn, the basement and stable of which are of quarried stone. Mr. Irwin has the stock and the grain to fill it.

Ten years ago John MacFarlane was on a rented farm in East Huron. He moved to New Liskeard and today he would not sell his holdings for less than \$10,000. He secured a crop from 140 acres last year. His son also owns a place of 140 acres.

Within a radius of 10 miles of New Liskeard there are 97 lumber mills. A large quantity of timber is shipped to the south and all that is needed locally is the product of the mills. Many of the mills do custom milling for the settler, saving the timber cut from his land at a nominal charge. The harvesting of timber keeps the settler busy during the winter and puts him in shape to finance his building, clear his land and get ready for his crop.

The pulp mills are a big factor in aiding the settler. There are three agents of large companies in the district. The return from pulp wood in the district is large.

What \$20 Grew To.

In 1892, Samuel McChesney came to New Liskeard. His total resources, when he landed, were \$20. Last year he farmed 200 acres, two miles from the town. From 55 acres of timothy he sold \$2,000 worth of seed, the straw of which sold at \$6 a ton, and there were 64 tons. He also raised:

450 bushels of barley off 8 acres.

280 bushels of fall wheat off 8 acres.

490 bushels spring wheat off 12 acres.

1,200 bags of potatoes off 7 acres.

800 bushels of oats off 8 acres.

100 tons of hay, besides what he kept for his own use.

And in addition he raised and sold \$1,000 worth of pork.

This great farm has now been rented, and its owner has secured 200 acres of land north of New Liskeard station. He sold \$3,400 worth of timber off this place last winter, and there is one more winter's cut on it. After the fall and the snow has set in, he will get it ready for the plow at a cost of \$10 an acre. He will have this 200 acres of the finest land for little more than nothing.

McChesney has a gasoline power outfit which he used for plowing, and in the winter time for his lumbering operations. He states that farmers who do fall plowing are always sure of good weather for early seeding. This is one of the secrets of farming success in Temiskaming. The growth is very rapid and heavy, and starts as soon as the ground is plowed.

Big Prices for Farms.

The businessmen of the district are beginning to recognize the value of the land. Taylor Pipe, of Cobalt, recently paid \$10,000 for an improved farm about three miles out from the town. A brewer of Cobalt paid \$5,500 for a farm about three miles out. Dan Stewart bought 640 acres of timbered land, and is clearing it up, expecting to have the largest part ready for seeding next year. He is fencing it and has plans for a large barn which he intends to build next summer.

To conclude, more than \$100,000 worth of farm implements was sold by Liskeard agents last year. The story of prosperity is told everywhere. Only the laggard is the grumbler, and ten years hence, with proper means of publicity and immigration, the visitor of 1912 will be scarcely able to tell the history of the fertile stretches of old Ontario.

Men of energy are in the towns of the north. They are young and vigorous, filled with the enthusiasm of the pioneer, and laying the foundations for a land that will blossom as a garden.

time to time. The Toronto Star has published a number of articles on the subject. The movement gains ground every day.

The problem of the New Liskeard district with which this series of articles deals does not have so much to do with "Staying in Ontario." New Liskeard wants everyone who is in Ontario to stay in Ontario, but it is first of all desirous of attracting settlers from other countries. It will first educate those who are of the same stock and afterwards it will have less difficulty in bringing about the introduction of more extensive machinery for advertising and settlement.

No More Prairies There.

Those who are determined to leave Old Ontario should not go beyond New Ontario, New Liskeard argues. To those who prefer a wooded landscape to a bleak prairie New Liskeard appeals. But its chief desire is not to be built up at the expense of Southern Ontario, but that it should secure its share of the landless thousands who seek homes and who are of the same stock as our sires or grandfathers.

New Liskeard, as a northern editor puts it, is great and prosperous for one reason only. It is the concrete expression of the fact that the Temiskaming district is a success as an agricultural country. It is the gateway to 20,000,000 acres of wonderfully fertile land.

EXPECT ONE MILLION

Toronto Fair Directors Look For Increased Attendance This Year.

When the Duke of Connaught touches the button and formally opens the Canadian National Exhibition, Toronto, Monday, August 26, the greatest annual exhibition in the world will be under way. This year half a million dollars have been spent in improving the magnificent exhibition park, and in bringing attractions from all parts of the world to make Imperial Year the greatest of a long line of successes.

Among the features this year might be mentioned the Imperial Cadet review and competitions in which cadets corps from Australia, New Zealand, England, Scotland, Ireland, Newfoundland and the provinces of the Dominion will take part; two famous bands from England, the Scots Guards and the Bees of the Barrs; two musical rides, one by the Royal Canadian Dragoons, and the other by the Calgary Mounted Cadets; a magnificent historical pageant—The Siege of Delhi; a hippodrome and circus on four stages and arena, and an Imperial programme of fireworks.

Last year's attendance was \$26,000. The increase of \$10,000, however, made for the accommodation of over a million.

FIFTY THOUSAND MEN REQUIRED

Farm Laborers' Excursions — This Year's Wheat Crop Will Be the Largest in THE HISTORY OF CANADA.

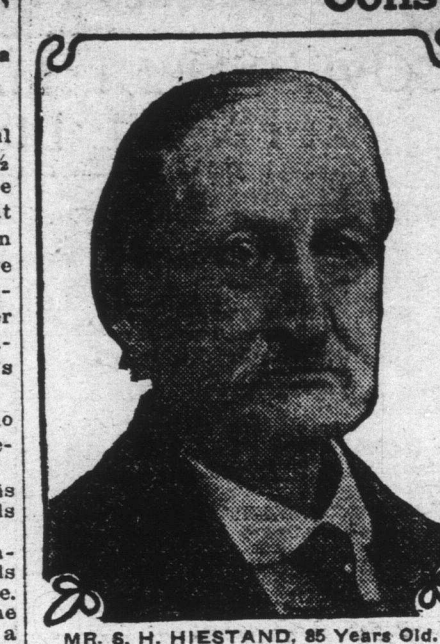

Nail to Fasten Latch.

There are many things stolen from an ordinary city back yard that would be taken in the hook on the back gate was not so easy to unfasten.

The hook can be made as secure as a padlock with an expenditure represented by the cost of one ordinary wire nail. The nail should be driven in the gate post about two inches above the latch to which the hook rests.
