ng Ontario, over 10,000,000 horsepower. Mr. Graham said that it was quite possible for St. Marys to have four trunk lines running into the town and connecting with outside municipalities. With hydro on the farm, telephones and radials, in fifteen years Perth, Middlesex, Oxford, Kent and Elgin counties would have more families on every 25 acres of land than are now on every hundred acres, and with intensive farming one man could make more money out of 25 acres of land than on 100 acres under former conditions.


