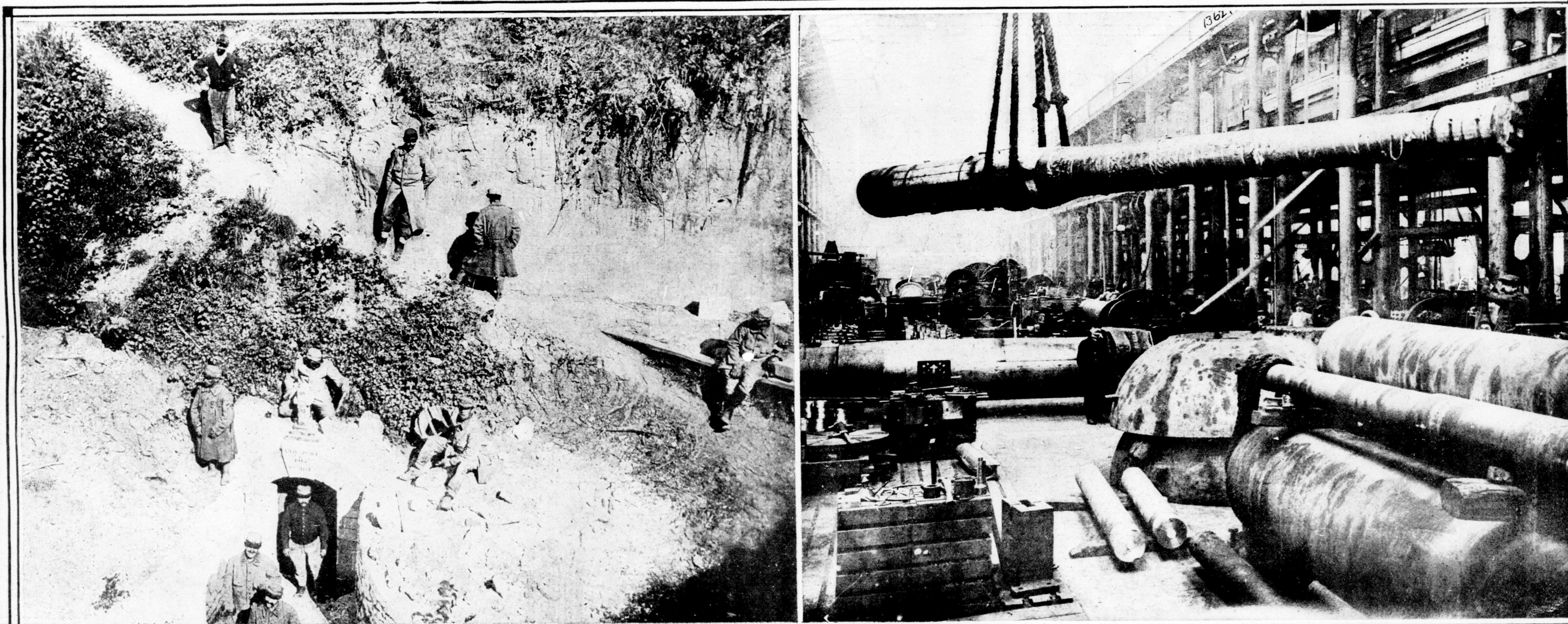


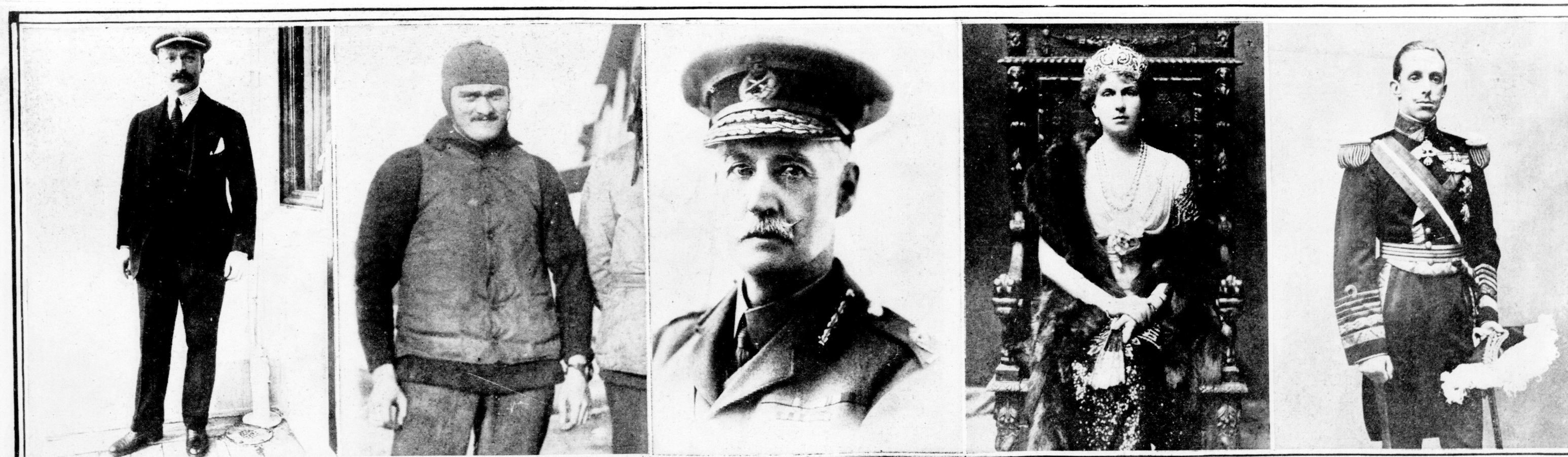
MADAM POINCAIRE VISITS THE AMERICAN HOSPITAL.
