CANDIDATES ADDRESS MEETING OF VETERANS

Soldiers' Memorial Hall Supported by All the Speakers.

After their regular meeting on Tuesday evening the Great War Veterans' Association listened to the various candidates for municipal offices in the coming election.

Henry B. Ashplant, who was chosen as mayoralty candidate by the soldier-labor convention, explained his platform, and his stand on various municipal matters.

Dr. Cameron Wilson, who is running for alderman in ward 2, declared that it was most important that the Memorial Hall bylaw be passed. Better would it be, he thought, if every soldier-labor candidate be defeated, and the bylaw passed than that the men be elected and the bylaw defeated.

J. P. Thompson, aldermanic candidate in ward 4, stated that he was qualified for the position he sought, as he had served fourteen years on the council of an English municipality. One fault he found with the present council was that it refused extension of the soldiers' insurance. At the time that it was voted on in the council, H. B. Ashplant and F. R. Watkinson were the only councilors who supported it.

Would Benefit Men.
John Ashplant, S. L. candidate for alderman in Ward 3, declared that a "meaner concern never lived on God's earth" than the street railway company. On one occasion it had given the men an increase of one-third of a cent per hour. He asked that the voters vote for increased fares as it would benefit 258 employees, especially the 220 married men, some of whom had as many as nine children.

Gordon Ingram spoke in favor of the soldiers' memorial hall. He said that the hall should be built on the Spencer Block. He was also in favor of the town-planning bylaw and the reservoir bylaw. The colonel declared that he believed in spending money while we were here as we would be a long time dead.

H. W. Ashley, who is running for alderman in Ward 1, H. Watkinson, alderman, Ward 4; F. R. Watkinson, alderman, Ward 3; Ald. C. G. Moorhead, Ward 4; D. Eggert, board of education, Capt. Fletcher and P. B. Lavender, board of education, also addressed the gathering.

Capt. Chester Butler was in the chair.

Today Last Day of Current Vaudeville Bill.

If Steve Honeycutt and Widow Hawn had followed the advice of their children, Mary Pickford wouldn't be able to offer such a wonderful picture as "Heart O' The Hills," which will be shown at the Grand today and for the remainder of the week.

As Mavis Hawn, Miss Pickford takes the part of a Kentucky mountain girl at war with certain factors which she knows nothing of, and determined at least to put an end to all time to the whippings which her mother has been liberally inflicting.

PREMIER DRURY IS CRITICISED BY G. W. V. A.

Members of the local Great War Veterans' Association at their regular general meeting last night went on record as being strongly opposed to the recent action of the Drury Government in ignoring the veterans and appointing a woman to the position of registrar of East and North Middlesex. It was claimed that there are 50 men here who are capable and willing to fill the office. The Government will be asked to reconsider its action. The resolution was moved and seconded by Comrades B. Devlin and Simas.

Juvenile courts were favored. Comrades Alfred Pugh and J. A. Maguire presented a resolution, which was passed, to the effect that the proper authorities be asked to establish a juvenile court here as has been done in Toronto.

Since a year ago the membership of the organization had increased from 1,000 to 2,000. Widows' claims to the amount of \$5,000 had been secured. Secretary J. W. Cumfitt wished it known that the association still supports the claims of all widows and orphans of soldiers.

One hundred pairs of socks were donated by the Red Cross for distribution, as New Year's gifts among the veterans.

A resolution of sympathy to the soldiers still in hospital wishing them a better new year was passed.

Dean of the Board of Education

Trustee Rowe's Friends Predict He Will Head the Polls.

Mr. Thomas Rowe, the well-known school trustee longer than any other member at present on the board of education. Few more useful trustees ever sat on this important board. His friends confidently predict that he will lead the polls on Thursday next. Mr. Rowe has been a most painstaking and conscientious trustee. He has served as chairman of all the important committees and was chairman of the board itself in 1917. Few members are so conversant with the needs of the schools and the procedures of the board as is Trustee Rowe. It was his desire to retire from the board this year, but he consented to serve again only at the persistent solicitation of his fellow-members of the board and a large number of citizens. The city is fortunate in having such men as Trustee Rowe to serve on a public body, which represents one of the largest civic spending departments.

To the Women Electors of London:

The approaching municipal elections will place upon you as a woman voter a distinct responsibility for the way you cast your ballot. As a woman voter you are bound to consider the interests of the home, the family, the children. Affect any of these and you affect the whole life of the community.

The contest for the Mayoralty in London this year has come to an issue between two forces. My opponent, an open champion of Socialistic doctrines in the past, is seeking to conceal his leanings in the present elections when he is presenting himself as the candidate of one particular class of the community. Among those associated with him are men of like views having scarcely a stake in the country who are avowedly class representatives and who are aiming to secure control of London's affairs.

I have placed myself before the people of London as a candidate for the Mayoralty, representing not one class, but all classes; not as the candidate of an extremist group, but holding firmly to principles of justice and fair play, equal rights to all and favors to none.

As a woman voter you know which of these two policies will be the best for the home, the family and the children growing up. Are we in London to be divided into classes warring one with another or are we to stand shoulder to shoulder, working with one mind to make London a better and bigger city?

As the candidate of all classes, bound by no ties or pledges, but those I have openly championed as tending to benefit the city as a whole, I appeal to you for your vote in the coming elections.
