COSTS \$11 HEAD FOR PRIVILEGE OF BEING SICK

Dr. Hill Tells Kiwanians London's Illness Prevention Bill Is \$1,800,000.

CONTRASTS IT WITH WAR

Latter Is Harmless Pastime When Compared With Ravages of Disease.

"We are paying \$11 a head in London for the privilege of being sick every year," was the startling message of Dr. H. W. Hill, of the Institute of Public Health, to the Kiwanis Club at their weekly luncheon Friday. Speaking on public health, Dr. Hill said that in the old days when the

matter of public health was referred to, people thought that it only meant to clean up the backyard or to clean off the streets, and the question had been solved, but today it had been proved that public health had to do with the health of every individual in the country, and that the cause of the disease was not outside a person but inside.

"It costs the city of London in money alone \$1,800,000 every year. in sickness, and we still have the sickness. If we could pay the money and not be sick it would not
