### Receipts Were Comparative Light in Some Classes of Animals.

Toronto, Feb. 28.—The cattle market continued fairly active again today, considering comparatively light receipts of some classes. Hogs, however, were again plentiful and the price was steady around 16c per lb.

Butcher cattle were steady. Some of the top sold at 8c, while the average run held about 6c to 7½c. Cows and a few odd lots sold at 6c for the top and mediums were 4c to 5½c.
