Toronto St. Pats. and Hamilton-Tigers in their clash here tomorrow night at the Arena mark the first appearance of professional hockey clubs in this city since it first became a thriving hockey center. To fandom in general it will be the first peek at the professional brand of hockey, and tomorrow night's game therefore marks a new step in local sport.

The fact that Goldie Prodger is a member of the Hamilton Tigers, also adds a big splash of color to tomorrow night's game. Fans of London have been proud of Prodger's outstanding achievements in professional ranks for the last fifteen years, but despite his long stay in the major league of the winter pastime it is surprising how few of the fans, with whom he was a prime favorite in his amateur days, have seen the big red head perform in the N. H. L.

Closes Best Year.

Prodger, despite the fact that he is listed among the veterans in experience and number of playing years, is just closing one of the best seasons he has ever had. This year his work was more outstanding than it has been before he gave up hockey to get into the bigger game in France. His work had a good deal to do with keeping the Hams in the race right up to the last moment after a particularly discouraging start. It was Prodger's steadiness which saved the start from being more discouraging than it was, and the Hams had need of his experience and versatility on either defence or attack at many other times during the season when injuries and casualties left breaches which had to be filled.

Anybody who thinks tomorrow night's clash will be purely exhibition had better derelict off that line and give new wrinkles a chance to form. For one thing, nobody ever accused the professional of dissimulating the filthy here so that the percentage was split in such a way that the winner of tomorrow night's game slips out of town with quite a lot more coin in his Majesty's realm than the others.

Again it's been proved that the pros, wily and experienced as they are, can't play up to an exhibition role in hockey any better than the amateur teams. The game is too fast for one thing for players to coolly work, according to plan, and Tigers and St. Pats simply can't agree when they once get on ice. The same prices as charged for the O. H. A. semi-finals will prevail, owing to the big guarantee made and the great expense entailed generally in securing this super attraction.

For the same reasons, and in view of the fact that the Arena company are in no way interested, the regular privileges granted box-holders have to be waived, and the usual prices will be charged for box-seats. Their tickets, however, will be on sale Tuesday at the Arena at 10 a.m., and will be held until 4 p.m. for their convenience.

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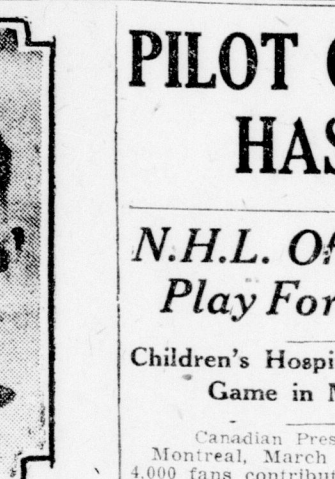
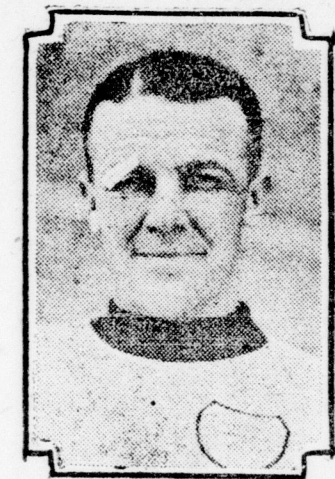
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THE HARD-SHOOTING BABE AND HIS PLAYMATES.
