MOTORIST DRUNK, GETS JAIL TERM

Woman Is Arrested Near Fair Grounds-Gets Fifteen Days.

STRUCK DRIVER

Drove Into Standing Car and Owner Is Badly Injured.

this city to a motorist, charged with driving a car while intoxicated, was handed down today by Magistrate A. H. M. Graydon in police court, when he sentenced Mrs. Alice Jones, 136 Grey street, to serve 15 days in the

Mrs. Jones was arrested last nigh in front of the Western Fair main entrance, racing her large touring car among the crowds in the street Earlier in the evening she had struck the rear of another motor and severely injured William Marshall, 552 Horton street, who was in the act of cranking his car when the smash occurred. He was dragged beneath his sister and brother, obtained the number of the touring car as it backed away from the scene of the accident and disappeared.

Most Aggravated. Branding the case as the most ag-gravated one which has come to his attention, Magistrate Graydon de-clared that Mrs. Jones was utterly heartless and brutal in her action. "The most unfortunate part about the affair is that you are a woman." Magistrate Graydon told Mrs. Jones In court today. "You might have killed a man. The case is particularly aggravating, coming at a time like this, when the exhibition is in pro-gress, and the streets are crowded. If something is not done to stop this it will go on forever. I feel inclined o inflict the maximum penalty in this

According to the evidence of two onstables who were on duty Western Fair grounds at 10:30 last night, the touring car approached the Dundas street entrance in leaps, the notor racing at full speed. Con-stable William Snell walked over to the car and found the driver, Mrs. Jones, intoxicated. He and Constable James Aitken placed Mrs. Jones under arrest, who was accompanied by another woman in the back seat, and drove the car to the police sta-

Gives Evidence.

Evidence given by William Marshall, told of how his car had been struck in the rear at the corner of Egerton and Dundas streets shortly before 10:30 o'clock. He was in the act of cranking his own car when the force of the impact hurled him to the ground. He was struck on the head and chest, and dragged 30 feet beneath the motor. Irene Hazelwood and Marshall's sister, who managed obtain the licence number of the offending motor car, gave substantiat ing evidence.

Jones pleaded not guilty to the charge, but offered no defence.
