Chief Birrell told of the 56 members of the police force and their efforts to use the old police building. He spoke of each room, and showed that it was impossible to carry on much longer in the present quarters.
"The clothing worn by the officers

costs money, paid out by the taxpayers," said the chief. "The uniforms should last four years. There is no way to look after them. They have to be folded in small boxes 18x12. There is no place to hang the gar.

"In a room 8x10 the capes and waterproof coats hang. The room is far too small, and the condition could not exist in a city the size

of London.

"You all know the sergeants' room," said the chief (laughter). "It is no place to pile clothes. There is no place to pile clothes. There should be a proper room, so that we could give the most amount of serpayer


