A Mermaid Company and a scenic and "Sense and Nonsense" reel complete the bill.

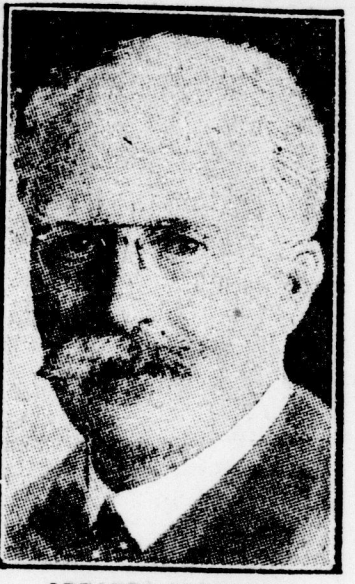

STANSELL ORDERED TO RETURN MONEY

Judge Declares Misrepresentation Was Made in Sale of Motor Stock.
INVOLVES \$3,000 CASH
Judgment Is Rendered in Action Taken Against President of London Motors.



Charging W. R. Stansell, president and general manager of the London Motors Company, with misrepresentation in the sale of stock, J. W. Wilkinson received a verdict from Mr. Justice Lennox at the non-jury sessions of the supreme court of Ontario last night. Mr. Justice Lennox ordered the defendant to surrender and restore the stocks, money amounting to \$3,000 and a promissory note for \$1,000. This constitutes full redemption of all moneys paid by the plaintiff to the London Motors by Mr. Wilkinson.

Judgment in this case also dismisses the case of Donald Finlayson vs. J. W. Wilkinson. Mr. Finlayson was in the employ of the London Motors Company, and Wilkinson's late partner, Mr. Wilkinson, was alleged to have sold him stock in the company. Mr. Wilkinson, however, had sold the stock to him for payment as wages. The action was dismissed with costs to the plaintiff.
In giving judgment Justice Lennox stated that there could be no doubt as to the proof of misrepresentation. He said the fact that Mr. Stansell had told Mr. Wilkinson of his former business in Amherstburg, which, it was alleged, he claimed he sold for \$387,000, leaves no other possible suggestion than misrepresentation. Although Mr. Stansell denied having told the plaintiff he had sold his business in Amherstburg for \$387,000, he admitted he told Wilkinson the business had been a failure.

Doubt Evidence.
"I have never known a man to say anything that would prevent the sale of stock," said Justice Lennox. Mr. Stansell said in the witness box that he told Wilkinson of his failure in Amherstburg in order to make a "clean breast of things."
When Mr. Wilkinson, his wife and daughter were called to the witness box yesterday they gave evidence to the effect that Mr. Stansell and two other men had called on them at their farm and told them, after they had introduced themselves that "London Motors is a great thing." They claimed Stansell told them he had sold an automobile business in Amherstburg for \$387,000 before he had come to London.

"Stansell told me he had bought a strip of property at Pottersburg," said Wilkinson. He also said he bought King streets, for which he paid \$51,000. This, he said, was bought with the money he had brought from Amherstburg, the \$387,000.
Receives Guarantee.
"Stansell guaranteed me that if I invested my money in London Motors I would receive 8 per cent interest every six months. He also promised me employment at \$50 per week and told me he would give employment to my daughters. He then told the girls not to look for jobs at any other place because he could afford to give higher wages than any other business firm."

Agreed to take \$4,000 worth of preferred stock, Stansell declared to me he would not collect a cent of salary until all the preferred stock shareholders made 8 per cent and until the common stock, which was to be issued, paid dividends.
According to Mr. Wilkinson, he came to London shortly afterwards and received employment at the London Motors, but no position was offered to either of his daughters.
"I asked Stansell why he didn't find a job for my girls, and he always put it off by saying, 'In a week or two,'" Wilkinson told the court.

"While I was working at the factory Stansell and Conley came to me and asked me to give them a promissory note for \$1,000."
Mr. Wilkinson was then asked by J. C. Elliott, acting for the plaintiff, if he had up until this time any suspicions that everything was not going just as it should.
Looked Grand.
"I believed everything looked grand," Wilkinson replied. "I had no suspicion of anything being wrong at this time. Later my wife and I commenced to get suspicious and we tried to see Mr. Stansell. We had a hard time to get him, but we finally saw him in August and asked for our money back. Stansell assured us that everything was running along smoothly and that we could have it out, interest and money, if we wanted."

Mr. Wilkinson then told how the company tried to collect payment on the \$1,000 note he had given, but, he said, frequently visits by members of the firm failed to make him pay.
Mr. Elliott asked of a prospectus had ever been given to which Wilkinson replied that he had never seen one.
Wilkinson told the court that he investigated and found that "things were not going as they should." He also said he had received no money, and that he was dissatisfied from the employ of the London Motors in the winter of 1921.

A. R. Douglas, solicitor for the defendant, questioned Mr. Wilkinson, and asked him if, when Mr. Stansell called at his home to induce him to buy stock, he had shown him blueprints of the London Six and the plant, which was to be built. Wilkinson answered that he had, and Stansell had given him 800 shares of common stock as an inducement to invest his money.
Sells Stock.
According to the evidence given yesterday, it was shown that when Mr. Wilkinson stated the employ of the London Motors he sold some stock on a commission. He had signed his name to stock receipts and had brought several of his friends to Mr. Stansell to have the business explained to them in order that they, too, might buy stock.
Three witnesses, Mrs. Sarah Gould, Lorne Avenue; John Haycock, Askin street, and William Mathews, Ridout street, were called by the solicitor for the plaintiff.

Mrs. Gould gave evidence to the effect that she had purchased stock in the London Motors in November of 1922 from Mr. Wilson for \$300. She stated she had been promised 8 per cent interest. According to Mrs. Gould, Mr. Wilson told her she need not fear to get her money back. "Never fear, you'll get it back," were the words Mr. Gould claimed Wilson told her. "Mr. Stansell said anyone who so desired could get their money back whenever they wanted it," she said.
John Haycock, laborer, told how he had purchased stock from Joseph Crouch in June, 1921. He claimed the London Motors offered him a job if he bought stock amounting to \$500. He got a position as night watchman for one year.
William Mathews, Ridout street, told how he purchased stock for \$1,000.
Mr. Stansell, president and general manager of the London Motors, defendant in the case, told how he had come to London in 1920 from Amherstburg, where he had endeavored to promote a company.

Denies Sale.
Mr. Stansell declared he had not sold out his business in Amherstburg to come to London, but had sold his interests for \$200 check and \$200 note. J. B. Whitley of Detroit bought him out, he said.
Mr. Stansell denied saying, as credited to him this morning by witnesses for the plaintiff, that the properties he purchased were "free and clear."
"When I went to the Wilkinson home I discussed the proposition at length, and told both Mr. and Mrs. Wilkinson that it was entirely up to them to buy the stock," said Mr. Stansell.
"They discussed the question between themselves, and signed the application in the evening. That night we typed a copy of a prospectus which they were not interested in. We gave them one prospectus because there was not one printed at that time."
Mr. Stansell was then cross-questioned by J. C. Elliott, counsel for the plaintiff.
Mr. Elliott asked him if he felt that the history of his auto business in Amherstburg was such that he needed to mention it to the Wilkinson sons in order to get it "off his breast."
Mr. Stansell replied, "Yes."
Q.—Did you tell them of the failure at Amherstburg?
A.—Yes.
Q.—Was it on that account they were so anxious to get in business? They were pointed out to you as being people who had ready money?
A.—Yes. We interviewed everybody who had money. The Wilkinson sons were likely prospects.
Q.—Didn't your brother-in-law explain to you they had recently sold out their farm?
A.—You got out there not knowing?
A.—Yes. I found out how much money they had when I got there.
Q.—Did you see a thousand dollars worth of stock and the remainder a mortgage?
Q.—Did you think that was an honest statement to make to them?
A.—Certainly.
"Why didn't you correct Mr. Griffith for stating to the Wilkinson sons that the money would be returned if they were dissatisfied?"
"I don't think that is business."
"How much preferred stock did you get?"
"Forty thousand dollars."
"What did you pay for it?"
"I traded by plans, equities and land."
"Did you draw a salary?"
"Yes. The board of directors voted me \$10,000 a year, which I never drew."

Questioned by A. R. Douglas, counsel for the defendant, Mr. Stansell declared that no automobile concern has ever been able to turn out as good a car for as many cars for the same amount of money expended as the London Motors did during its three years' life.

BLACK AND WHITE REVUE OF 1924 IS SHOW SUPREME

Audience At Grand Clamor For Encores Throughout Entire Performance.

JULIAN ELTINGE IS STAR

For two hours and a half last night patrons of the Grand Opera House enjoyed without going to New York one of the finest and most entertaining revues ever brought to London. "Black and White Revue of 1924" opened last night for a three-day run, with Saturday matinee.
With Julian Eltinge, famous female impersonator, and Tom Brown, renowned saxophone player, headlining the company, the "Black and White Revue of 1924" offered all that could be desired in the way of varied and clever entertainment. Dances, music, humor and all that go to make the successful offering are present in abundance, and there is not one moment when the performance lags. The costumes are smart and the performers themselves enter into the work with a vim, doing it well, to judge from the encores demanded from every turn presented.
Undoubtedly Julian Eltinge, who is acclaimed the most famous and versatile female impersonator on the American continent, if not in the whole known theatrical profession, is entitled to the praise. With gorgeous gowns and beautiful wigs, Eltinge makes a woman of the most fascinating type and were it not for the fact that it was known he was but impersonating the type, no one would for one minute guess that he was not of the feminine sex.
To all lovers of jazz and saxophone music is Tom Brown and his saxophone band known. And for 15 or 20 minutes last night playgoers of London had the satisfaction of hearing them in person and learning that they are every bit as good and more interesting as the type they are reported. The Six Brown Brothers certainly offer something new when it comes to saxophones, and Tom Brown himself, makes his instrument talk, laugh and cry. So pleased were the listeners that three encores were not enough.

"Blackface" Eddie Ross is in a class by himself when it comes to expressing a monologue, with the most serious mien possible. Ross takes the audience into his confidence and tells of his family. Not a line of his patter has been heard in the city before and it really is something new in this banjo.
Turning to the dancing it is hard to know what to say. Several dances of various kinds are offered by persons of great talent and cleverness. In the first act a group of seven dances is offered, each one being done to perfection. Theresa Valerio, in addition to forming one of a trio dance, "Essence" in a pleasant voice. The others that dance with her are Eddie Kennedy, formerly with George Primrose Minstrels, and Harry Young. The "Adagio," a dance done by Evelyn, De Gage and Harold Day, is in a class by itself and something that has not been attempted before in this city. Jeff Sayre, who offers a "Dance Eccequique," receives the plaudits of the spectators. The waltz by Jack Kinney and Hilda Lee was also well done. Dances on the hands was the specialty offered by Jack Eddy, who manages as well upside down as many others do on their feet.

Sylvester Jones, Pringle and Morrell form a male quartet that harmonize well, and that renders songs, both old and new. Besides singing as a whole, individual numbers are offered, all proving most acceptable. The ensembles are good, particularly the last, where 28 saxophones are played by members of the company, while another dozen do a dance. There is no chorus, as choruses are known, but the female members of the company are more than make up for this lack, they being finished dancers and singers. Their costumes are good and evidently expensive.
The whole offering, to give it its due, is one of the best that Londoners have had a chance of seeing, the artists being such well-known stars in their respective lines, and carrying out their share of the work of entertaining with a sincere sincerity as though on Broadway.

D.; four brothers, Thomas of Bay City, Frank and Charles of Lumbria, and James of London Township. One sister, Mrs. Hillis, resides in Delhi, Ont.
The funeral will be held Saturday at 10:30 from the funeral home of George E. Logan & Sons to the N. R. depot, where the remains will be forwarded to Onida on the 11:50 train.

Mother Kills Self and Babe

Toronto Woman Suffered From Mental Derangement.
