Opposition to the bill in the British Columbia Legislature sanctioning the establishment in that province of a branch of McGill university, the great educational institution which has its beadquarters in Montreal, developed at a meeture of the school board of Victoria, and while it may not be sufficiently strong to defeat the passage of the bill, it displays a sentiment on the part of many British Columbians to have a university of their own, rather than an annex of one in another province.

Local pride of this kind is certainly to be commended, and if there is a possibility of money enough being raised to build a provincial university it would certainly seem preferable to promote the local project. That there is plenty of money in Victoria is beyond question. Advices from there Indicate that it is a drug on the market and that banks are reluctant to accept any more interest bearing deposits. But whether the people who have it could be induced to open their purses for the establishment of a university has not been clearly demonstrated. In the absence of such a spirit of liberality the legislature can hardly be blamed if it takes advantage of what appears to be a liberal offer on the part of McGill university, while at the same time admitting that that institution has an eye open for the benefits to accrue to litself.

Factions Use Dynamite

Red Terrorists Explode Bomb in St. Petersburg Workmen's Restaurant.

Building Is Completely Wrecked and Debris Presents Sickening Sight.

Revolutionists Open Fire on Victims and Many Are Killed and Wounded.

T. PETERSBURG, Feb. 9.—The war between the fighting organization of the revolutionists and the so-called "Black Hundred" assumed a new phase tonight when a band of reds surrounded the cabaret Schlussberg-Chausse, on the bank of the Nevsky river above the city, and threw a bomb among an assemblage of workmen. The reds then opened fire on the panic stricken immates of the carabet, killing two and seriously wounding eight-The lecture was illustrated by experiments showing methods of detecting adulterations.
