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## AID "CANADA" HAS LANDED GASPE CONTRACT.

Campbellton's Wishes Said to Have Been Ignored and Old Boat Put On.

### THE OUTLOOK.

The Graphic learns on very good authority that the government has decided to award the subsidy for the Campbellton-Gaspe service to the company which has recently purchased the steamer Canada, and that this steamer will perform the service this summer.

The Canada is an old boat and is not a first class accommodation for passengers, although the company has promised to have the boat put in good shape. It is a slow boat, with none of the modern conveniences, and it is said that those who know that she is not fitted for the route she is expected to serve.

Campbellton people will regret to hear that the Canada is not to receive the subsidy but it may be that she is put on the route independently at least the busy part of the season.

At least encouragement should be given to the Thompson Company to put this steamer on, if only the subsidy is not to be received.

We may add that Messrs Reid and Gill did all in their power to have the contract go to the Seneca, but the contract is considered a Gaspe venture naturally Mr. Lennox wishes the influence and the reward that strong pressure was brought to bear from interested parties in Gaspe.

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## TOWN COUNCIL HELD MEETING

Special Meeting Held Last Night When Delegates to Municipality Meeting Were Appointed.

### OBJECTS OF UNION.

The Town Council held a short session last evening, the full board meeting being held on Monday night. The finance, fire, police and water and sewerage committees reported on accounts and matters referred to them at a previous meeting. Robert H. Warren was appointed a member of the police force, to enter upon his duties on Monday.

A petition from John White, complaining of unfair assessment on land, asking for a rebate was referred to the Committee on Assessment and Appeals. A resolution was adopted concerning the Town of Campbellton a member of the Union of New Brunswick Municipalities for the current year. The Town of Campbellton and the Mayor Murray Council were appointed to represent the Town at the meeting of the Union which will be held on Monday on the 10th and 11th inst. The objects of the Union are set out in their constitution, as follows:

## ITALIAN MURDERERS TO DIE

I. N. COMPANY IN LIQUIDATION

Meeting of Company Called for March 16th to Consider Matter.

### THE CAUSE.

The Interprovincial Navigation Company will go into voluntary liquidation at an early date. This is the outlook at the present time.

The Interprovincial Navigation Company was organized to place an up to date steamer on the Campbellton-Gaspe route. Its members are all Bay Chaleur people. The steamer Lady Ellen was purchased, and the route successfully until last season, when she was wrecked at New Port Island. This was a severe blow to the company, and as the vessel was a complete loss it was felt best to withdraw from the field.

A call to the stockholders has been issued to meet next Tuesday at Port Daniel to take up the matter of choosing a liquidator, and taking the necessary steps to wind up the company.

## JURY BROUGHT IN VERDICT OF GUILTY AND SLAYERS OF EDWARD GREEN SENTENCED TO HANG MAY 4TH SCENE IN COURT ROOM.

YOUNGER SAYS HE IS INNOCENT.

PORT, N. B., Mar. 6.—On the morning of May 4, Leon Seppelt and Antonio Arosio, will be executed at Andover to pay the penalty for the murder of Edward Green. Standing room was at a premium in the court room on Saturday morning when sentence was pronounced by Judge Lindsay and it was after much difficulty that a path was formed through the mass of spectators on the main floor to permit the convicted Italians to pass into the dock from their cells under the building.

Seppelt walked with his usual swagger, whilst Arosio's step was not as graceful as of old. His countenance and manner indicated that he had passed a sleepless night. However Seppelt seemed to be on the verge of illness.

### The Death Sentence

To them Judge Lindsay spoke as follows in sentencing them: "You, Antonio Arosio, and you, Leon Seppelt, have been accused and found guilty of the murder of Edward Green. Due care has been exercised in your defence and all the protection possible has been afforded to you. You have not suffered for the advice of counsel and no jury could find another verdict. You are too callous to take advice from the bench. The importance of the protection of the laws is apparent."

As Walling referred the game in an impartial manner and to the satisfaction of all present the game of the Dalhousie Hockey Club entertained the visitors at the Quebec Hotel where supper was served.

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### STORM IN QUEBEC WAS A TERRIFIC BLIZZARD.

Trains Held up For Hours and Road in very Bad Shape for Traffic.

### LINE NOW CLEAR.

Delayed by the heavy snow storm which raged in the province of Quebec the maritime express train had a most difficult time of it.

Friday's Maritime express from Montreal did not arrive here until Saturday afternoon while the express which was due to arrive here Saturday morning did not arrive here until late Saturday afternoon. The express which left Montreal on Wednesday night, had about the most strenuous time of any train in the province in Montreal until Saturday morning when the train which left here on Sunday night arrived Sunday, and the maritime which left here Friday night had a hard time to get through that evening also.

A Montreal despatch received last night says that the express from Montreal which was held up by the storm on Thursday and Friday has produced general demoralization in the railway service east of Montreal, but the region north of Lake Superior and between that lake and Lake Ontario has escaped both the violent blasts and the heavy snowfall.

The consequence of this has been that the lines between here and Toronto and between here and Port William and the various New York systems have suffered great impediments to the working of the traffic, and operating men have succeeded in getting their trains through with little variation from scheduled times.

There are tremendous gales and blinding drifts over a wide sweep of the lower St. Lawrence. These have been particularly continuous since early Thursday.

The L. C. R. local from Campbellton due here at ten o'clock Thursday night was blown off the rails at eight o'clock Friday morning and reported tremendous drifts and gales blowing with a velocity of sixty miles an hour in the eastern part of the province. The Nicolet train for Montreal started for several hours, but it got in before three Friday afternoon.

The C. P. R. Halifax express due at 8 a. m. was for several hours held in huge drifts between forty and fifty feet high east of Megantic. For hours these drifts defied the snow plow, but at last the line was re-opened clear and from Megantic inland good progress was made.

## BIG COAL STRIKE AT ST. ISADORE

Prospectors at Work Drill Through Four Foot Seam of Good Coal.

### ARE ENTHUSIASTIC.

That there was coal at St. Isadore has been known for some time, but it was thought that the coal seam was too thin to be of any value.

A number of gentlemen who, upon being told that coal existed there in abundance and a company was formed, in which several Gloucester and Kent County men are interested to explore the district at St. Isadore. Considerable preliminary work was done last fall and this winter the government has been at work for some time. At various depths seams of coal have been bored through, some of them only a few inches and one at least over two feet deep, but last week at 2' depth or about five hundred feet a seam four feet thick has been bored through. The prospectors are very enthusiastic and no doubt a strong company will be organized to develop the property.

### With abundance of coal and iron in Gloucester county, with its excellent farming and wealth, that county has fair to be the most prosperous in the province.
