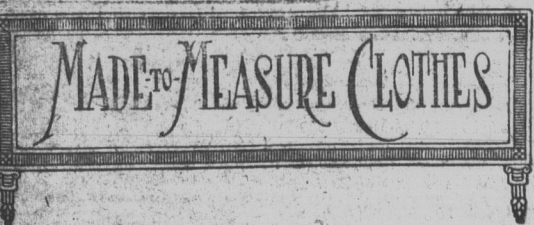

DIMOCK BUILDING GUTTED BY FIRE

Bad Blaze on Monday Morn-
ing on Water St.—Heavy
Destruction of Property

THE LOSSES

Fire broke out on Monday morn-
ing in the concrete building on
Water St. owned by S. W. Dimock
and occupied by Thos. Wran, Drug-
gist, Messrs. H. C. Montgomery
& Co., Jewelers, C. R. Mersereau,
photographer, S. W. Dimock, Real
Estate, and Mrs. Degrace, Dress-
making rooms.

About 2 o'clock Mrs. Degrace
who occupied part of the first floor
was awakened by dense smoke and
breaking out of the windows threw
out a quilt and jumped to the
ground. Making her way to her
neighbor Mrs. Richard, an alarm
was sent in to central who phoned
the chief, who then turned in an
alarm from Box 31.

The hose reel and firemen were
early on the scene and had four
streams working on the building
under good pressure. By this time
the interior of the building was a
seething furnace; explosions of wood
alcohol adding to the dangers. The
firemen were working under great
difficulties, owing to the intense
cold, the water from the hose freez-
ing as it touched the building.

Some of the firemen received minor
injuries from burns and frost bite,
the temperature being sixteen below
with a high wind.

The building was entirely gutted,
but the fire was confined to its first
building by strenuous efforts. The
loss will be very heavy but insur-
ance was carried by all except Mrs.
Degrace, who lost everything.

Mr. Dimock was the heaviest
loser by the fire, the adjuster val-
uing the building at \$9000 with in-
surance of \$5000 making a straight
loss of \$4000.

Mrs. Degrace saved nothing but
a mirror which was thrown out of the
window by the force of the water
from the hose. She and the girl
who was with her saved nothing.

Mr. C. R. Mersereau had \$600
insurance and his loss will amount
to between \$500 and \$600.

The loss on the stock of Mr.
Thos. Wran, Druggist and Messrs.
H. C. Montgomery & Co., were
satisfactorily adjusted.

Speaking with the chief after the
fire he stated that it was the worst
fire they had had to handle since
the big fire, and was satisfied with
the way it had been handled.

On behalf of the firemen he de-
sired to publicly thank Mr. W. H.
Gray who supplied free meals to the
firemen, to Mrs. J. F. Gallagher who
supplied them with hot coffee and
refreshments, which were greatly
relished and very acceptable.

EXPRESS WRECKED

North Bay, Ont., Feb. 13.—The Collis ex-
press from Toronto to this morning on the G. T.
R. was wrecked near Trout Creek by a loaded
rail. Fortunately the accident happened at
11 o'clock, the cars piled up and turned
over, many passengers were thrown, heavily
from their berths to the floor, but no one was
seriously injured.

DEATH OF MAYOR FRANK M. MURRAY

Passes Away on Monday
Morning of Pneumonia After
a Weeks illness

THE FUNERAL

Campbellton's Mayor passed
away on Monday morning at 9.15
after a week's illness; aged 44 years.

Mr. Murray contracted a chill the
previous Sunday which rapidly
developed into pneumonia. Two
consultations were held by Drs.
Pinault and Lunam, but a change
for the worse was noted on Sunday
afternoon and he gradually sank,
death supervening on Monday
morning.

He leaves a widow and three
children two girls and a boy.

The funeral which was held on
Wednesday was a public one, and
he was buried with Masonic ritual.

A short service at the home of
the deceased was held by Rev. C.
W. Squires and at two o'clock the
local masons and visiting brethren
marched to the Methodist Church
taking up their places in the front
centre pews. Shortly after two the
body was borne by the Town
Councillors acting as pall-bearers to
the front of the rostrum the
congregation standing.

The service was conducted by
Rev. C. W. Squires, Methodist
minister assisted by Rev. T. P.
Drummond, B. D., St. Andrews; Rev. J.
E. Purdie, Christ Church and Rev.
J. H. Jenner, Baptist Church.

In his sermon the Rev. W. Squires
spoke of the high business qualities
and integrity of the late mayor of
the confidence the people had in
him as such, and his devotion to his
work.

The procession was afterwards
formed the Masons marching in
line to the rural cemetery where the
body was committed to the grave.

There were many floral tributes
among them being wreaths from
the Town Council, Masonic Lodge,
Campbellton Curling Club, from
many others, the whole front of
the rostrum in the church being a
mass of flowers.

Frank M. Murray who came here
from Fredericton, travelled for a
time for the Reed Co. of Montreal,
becoming the first manager here
when they opened their branch in
Campbellton.

He then went into business
writing and a few years ago he
came to Campbellton to start a
coal business in his ventures which
was very successful.

Last April he was elected Mayor
of the town by acclamation and
although he had no previous
Council experience he made a
splendid official and was one of
the most popular mayors the town
ever had. He brought keen
business qualities and a high sense
of integrity into all his doings, and
the town business was felt to be
safe in his hands.

He was a brother to F. R.
Murray recently with Emmerson
Fisher St. John but at present in
Vancouver.

The loss of Mr. Murray is tender-
ly felt by all classes of the people
and the sympathy of every one is
extended to the sorrowing widow
and family.

By the death of the Mayor a new
election will require to be held, as
the act of incorporation does not
apply to allow the Deputy Mayor
the powers of a mayor upon the
death of this official.

While Mr. R. J. Lavoie was prevailed
upon to give his "Chicken in the
pan."

A most enjoyable evening was
brought to a close by the singing of
"Auld Lang Syne", and the Nation-
al Anthem.

THE TOWN COUNCIL PASS RESOLUTION

Regular Meeting Held Tues-
day Evening but Ordinary
Business is Suspended

The regular meeting of the coun-
cil was held on Tuesday evening,
Deputy Mayor John White in the
chair. There were present Coun-
cillors Alexander, Stewart, Tanam,
Ellsworth, Sansom and Pinault.

On motion regular order of busi-
ness was suspended, and council
proceeded to draft resolution of con-
dolence to the widow and family of
the late Mayor Frank M. Murray.

Councillor Alexander moved and
councillor Stewart seconded and re-
solved that the following resolution
of condolence be adopted and in-
scribed in full on minutes, copies
printed in the town newspapers and
a copy sent to the widow of the late
Mayor.

The Resolution

Whereas it has pleased Almighty
God in His infinite wisdom to re-
move from among us His Worship,
Frank Melburne Murray, Mayor of
this Town, who departed this life on
Monday, the tenth day of February
instant; and

Whereas the deceased has oc-
cupied the position of Mayor for the
past nine months in a manner ac-
ceptable to the members of this
Council who have been associated
with him in the transaction of the
affairs of the town during that time,
and has merited the confidence
which the citizens of the town placed
in him when they selected him as
their first Councillor; and

Whereas it is fitting that this
Council place on record its appre-
ciation of the many virtues of the
deceased and the great loss the
town has suffered by the death of
one of its most energetic public-
spirited citizens;

Resolved, that this
Council do hereby express its deep
sympathy to the family of the de-
ceased, and that the members of the
Council do hereby express their
condolence to the widow and family
of the deceased, and that the mem-
bers of the Council do hereby ex-
press their sympathy to the citizens
of the town who have been associ-
ated with him in the transaction of
the affairs of the town during that
time.

Resolved, that the following
resolution of condolence be adopted
and inscribed in full on minutes,
copies printed in the town newspa-
pers and a copy sent to the widow
of the late Mayor.

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
