OBITUARY.

Elizabeth Mowat.

The death of Miss Elizabeth Mowat took place at her late home in Maria, Que., on July 2nd, 1921 after a short illness of Arteriosclerosis.

Miss Mowat was one of the oldest residents of the County of Bonaventure, living to the ripe old age of 98 years, 4 months and 17 days, being born at Maria, Que., on March 14th, 1823.

She was a very active and industrious person, as were all the members of her family and took a keen interest in all the events of the day, until the last hours of her life.

Miss Mowat was of Scotch descent, her father and mother William Mowat

and Lucy Lindsay McCormick respectively, being natives of the Orkneys Scotland. Her parents came to Canada shortly after their marriage in Scotland and settled on a large farm at Maria, Que., being one of the first settlers of that place.

Miss Mowat was the third daughter of a family of eight children, and was the last survivor, all of whom lived to a ripe old age.

This family was very popular and prominent in their day throughout the counties of Bonaventure, Gaspé and Restigouche, where hospitality and welcome were extended to many a weary traveller on his or her journey through the country, railroads being unknown in that part of the country in her younger days.

Their old residence which was built over one hundred years ago is still standing.

Mr. J. D. Robertson, nephew of the deceased, with his family now occupy the old homestead.

After a short service at her late residence the remains were taken to St. Andrew's Church, New Richmond, where a most impressive and pathetic service was conducted by her pastor, Rev. A. McKay. The service at her late residence and St. Andrew's Church were largely attended by neighbours and friends from far and near.

Rev. A. McKay spoke of the beautiful christian life Miss Mowat lived, her cheerful disposition, her kindness and thoughtfulness till her last dying moments. He read parts of her favorite chapters, John 14, Psalms 23 and 103. Her favorite hymns, "Bringing in the Sheaves" and "Nearer My God to Thee" were beautifully rendered by Miss Harvey.

The remains were laid to rest in the Mowat family plot in St. Andrew's cemetery. The floral tributes were many and beautiful.
