BIND FURRIERS STEAL BEAR SKINS

Three Armed Robbers Hold Up Seventh Ave. Shop—Tie Up Three Men.

New York, Sept. 16.—Walking into the fur store of Wilkenfeld & Frankel on the ground floor at 279 Seventh avenue, three robbers held up the place at the point of a pistol, bound Samuel Wilkenfeld and Louis Frankel, members of the firm, and Samuel uel Wilkenfeld and Louis Frankel, members of the firm, and Samuel Kirshbaum, a clerk, and escaped with more than \$2,000 worth of choice beaver skins.

He was thus engaged when Wilkenfeld walked into the store.

The robbers stuffed about 125 skins in a couple of sacks and hurried out to a waiting car.
