SEPARATE SCHOOL TAXES.

A Proposition Which Was Discussed in

Joint Session Yesterday.

A sub-committee of the City Executive met

yesterday afternoon to confer with delegates

from the Public and Separate School Boards

to the matter of the proposition of the Separate

School Board to obtain a proportion of the

taxes of the city, the balance to be paid over

to the Public School Board. The meeting was

occupied the chair, the other city representatives

being Ald. Carleton (St. Thomas), Johnston and

Gilliespie. The Public School Board sent

Frank Somers, H. E. Kent and E. S.

David. Rev. Father McCann, Dr. Cassidy,

William Felt and J. J. Foy, Q.C., were

present on behalf of the Separate schools.

Mr. Foy, Rev. Father McCann and Dr.

Cassidy placed the merits of the proposition

before the meeting, claiming that it would

be adopted if it would save an infinity of

trouble not only to the Separate School

Board, but also to the officials of the City

Treasurer's Department. Mr. Felt stated

in effect that they did not come to the Council

a beggar, but had rights which the City

the city to grant or withhold. At present

there were numbers of Catholics on the public

school list of supporters. He was one of

them and this difficulty would be avoided if

the rate was struck as desired.

Mayor Kent, Somers and David were then

asked to give the views of the Public

School Board. Mr. Kent stated that the

sentiments of the trustees were hostile to the

change. Things were going on all right as

they were. Of course he was aware that the

board had no power in the matter, and all it

could do would be to petition and otherwise

to oppose it in council. All they were there

for was to hear what was said and report to

the board. Mr. David agreed with Mr. Kent.

There were several difficulties in the way of

adopting the scheme, and special legislation

would have to be made. The separate school

residents need not complain of Catholics

being on public school lists, he said, when

such a champion of Protestantism as Mr.

E. P. Roden appeared on the separate school

list. He believed that there were quite a

number of Protestants on the separate

school list. Mr. Somers was quite willing

that the Catholics should get all the taxes to

which they were entitled, but was opposed to

the adoption of the proposition.

City Treasurer Harmon favored the

proposition as an increase of income and a

just one. He submitted a memorandum of

the figures of six years' taxes and the amount

paid to supporters of the separate schools.

The average was \$3.10, showing that the

Catholic proportion was very low. It was

determined to adjourn the consideration of

the matter until the officials of the corporation

The New Dog Bylaw.

The Markets and Health Committee met

yesterday afternoon. The expenses of the

department for the past quarter as compiled

by the City Comptroller amounted to \$20,

000 for the Health branch, and \$1200 for the

Markets. The increase over the same period

last year, which were about \$2000, were owing

to the advanced cost of cartage. There were

4150 cattle, 840 sheep and 2150 pigs received

in the Western Cattle Market during April,

and the receipts by the weighmaster were \$63.

The market constables were ordered to re-

ported by License Inspector Aird to be \$1000.

The new dog bylaw was discussed at the

meeting. It was agreed that the fee for

dogs will be \$1 and for bitches \$2. Any

owner who allows a dog to remain about his

house and premises shall be deemed the owner

of the animal. Arrangements are made for

the establishment of two pounds, and every dog

found running about the streets to be brought

to them and either destroyed or sold. A re-

ward of 50 cents is to be paid for each dog de-

livered at the pound. The animal penalties

attach to the infringement of the bylaw. The

committee accepted the different clauses.
