University College.

In the conference that drew up the univer sity federation scheme certain guarantees wer given for the future maintenance of Universit College in a state of efficiency in deference t the fear that by the withdrawal of the scientific and philosophical chairs to build up a University professoriate common to all the federating colleges, the corporation of University College would be so diminished as to become con emptible as a learned body. To this end the Federation Act, passed in 1887, enacts : (1) that University College shall be managed academically, as heretofore, by a Council, made up of the professors, the president and the dean of residence ; (2) that five members of the Council shall be a quorum for the transaction of business; (3) that the Council, as then constituted, may "make regulations for the management of the property and business' of the College, and "for any purpose" neces sary for carrying the Federation Act into

effect: (4) that the teaching faculty of the \$1,00. College shall include "a professor, a lecturer and a fellow" in each of the subjects, Greek, Eatin, French, German and English, a professor and lecturer in Oriental languages, and a professor of moral philosophy. The object of this provision, as all who followed the disons of two years ago are aware, was to keep the staff of professors in University College undiminished and the Council of the same stitution with the same membership as heretofore.

The proclamation which brings the Federa tion Act into effect makes it imperative on the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council now to fufill their explicit agreement with the friends of University College and to do it as soon as possible. The statute leaves them no option except as to time, and any postponement that is not absolutely necessary would be an inexcusable violation of a well-understood compact. When the Act comes in force there will be left in the teaching faculty of "University College only three professors, teaching Classics, English and Oriental Languages Irespectively; and there will be left in the College Council only these three professors and the president and dean, neither of the latter two being a member of the College teaching staff. In a short time the announcement of the College staff and work for next session must be pubhished, and before that is done, if faith is to be kent with the friends of the College, every chair should be filled, even if the lecturers and fellows are not all appointed. This means that the chair of classics must be divided into two, and that a professor of French and a professor of German must be appointed, as well as a professor of Latin.


