A CONSTABLE, BUT A THIEF.

IT IS ALLEGED THAT THOMPSON IS A BIGAMIST.

Arrested the Day After His Marriage On a Charge of Being the Perpetrator of Numerous Robberies in York Township During the Past Couple of Years—Much Stolen Property Recovered.

County Constable William John Thompson, alias Waters, who was arrested at Peterborough on Monday morning, charged with stealing coats, haggies, harness, fowl and other portable articles from York farmers, appears to be a man with a record.

At his preliminary hearing yesterday before Squire Paxton, J.P., a large number of people were present, many of whom claimed to have been swindled by the man.

He was committed for trial on three charges, viz., stealing a coat in November, 1893, from the stable of Frank Lawrence, lot 15, concession 1, West York, which he sold to Henry Cole; stealing a turk sold it to Abel Cole; stealing a large dog from William Under, lot 21, concession 3, West York, on June 15, 1894; stealing a cow from Fred Piper, quantities were exchanged for furs, etc.

He was remanded until Saturday next on the charge of stealing ducks from Mrs. J. W. Jones.

Much Stolen Property Found.

When Thompson's house was searched a large number of miscellaneous articles were found among them being two sets of harness, one belonging to Levee W. Page of Richmond Hill. There were also buffalo and goat robes and walrus galore. A policeman's parade belt was also among the articles.

A short time before Thompson got married he purchased a lot of new furniture from Lemuel Talbot, the Queen-street furniture dealer, on the instalment plan and had it delivered at his house in McKenney-avenue, being a mortgage on the goods for a loan of \$50. Not being satisfied with this, and before Mr. Moran had time to record the mortgage, he proceeded to George H. Day, broker, 84-1-2 King-street east, and obtained another loan of \$50.

As soon as Mr. Tebb heard of Thompson's address he removed the furniture he had sold him, and a warrant for which he had secured a landlord's warrant for rent the morning.

Swindled a Pedlar Out of His Wedding Suit.

Before starting on his wedding trip Thompson borrowed from the Rev. Perry of the Toronto Junction Methodist Church, whom he knew, having had charge in the past of the Sunday school. He was also successful in effecting a loan of \$11 from Mr. Robert Clark of the Junction, whom he asked for \$100, and would have got it had Mr. Clark not been notified of the matter.

Thompson has been a resident of the Beaufort district for about two years, and it was generally supposed he was in comfortable circumstances. He told his wife that he had bought a farm, one of which was located in Muskoka. Until the present charges were laid he bore a good character among his neighbors.

About a year ago, on the recommendation of a republican, he was appointed a county constable, but he has never made any arrests.

Also Alleged to Be a Bigamist.

A great deal of sympathy is expressed for the innocent young girl to whom Thompson was married. She was a Miss Brown, and has one child, a boy, who is out from England, and has no friends or relatives in this country. The couple were married by Rev. Mr. Thompson at the Junction, and they left for Peterboro, next day Thompson was notified by Peterboro by County Constable Moyalhan, who followed him on his wedding trip.

She is still in Peterboro, Thompson having told her after his arrest that he had to go to Toronto to give evidence on a case. She refuses to believe the reports of her husband's perjury.

It is now said that Thompson has a wife and family in England. He is a man about 45 years of age.
